- Jesus is the true and better Adam, who passed the test in the garden and whose obedience is imputed to us (1 Corinthians 15).
- Jesus is the true and better Abel, who, though innocently slain, has blood that cries out for our acquittal, not our condemnation (Hebrews 12:24).
- Jesus is the true and better Abraham, who answered the call of God to leave the comfortable and familiar and go out into the void "not knowing whither he went" to create a new people of God.
- Jesus is the true and better Isaac, who was not just offered up by his father on the mount but was truly sacrificed for us all.
- Jesus is the true and better Jacob, who wrestled with God and took the blow of justice we deserved so that we, like Jacob, receive only the wounds of grace to wake us up and discipline us.
- Jesus is the true and better Joseph, who at the right hand of the King forgives those who betrayed and sold him and uses his new power to save them.
- Jesus is the true and better Moses, who stands in the gap between the people and the Lord and who mediates a new covenant (Hebrews 3).

### Recap from last week's lesson

**Contrast: Step-brothers and Their Attitudes** 

Abimelek was Gideon's (Jerub-baal's) son by concubine.

Gideon rescued the people of Israel from the Midianites,
then he refused when the people wanted to make him king;
when he died his son Abimelek killed all of his step-brothers
(except for one who escaped),
and put himself up as king;
he did not follow in the ways of God.

Jephthah was Gilead's son by a prostitute.

His step-brothers forced him to go away and live elsewhere.

He went and gathered a group of "scoundrels" around him.

When the Ammonites invaded,

the step-brothers begged him to come and save them.

He defeated the Ammonites

(and the rebellious Ephraimites).

He then led Israel for six years.

### **Comparisons: Moses and Paul [Charles Swindoll]**

- 1. they were "in charge" at an early point in their lives
- 2. they suffered an abrupt change
- 3. they took flight (ran away)
- 4. they had to wait in obscurity
- 5. they returned in power (with help of someone God sent)
- 6. they attained a position of leadership
- 7. they each wrote a large part of the Bible
- 8. they stood at the threshold of a new kingdom (Moses before, Paul after)
- 9. there were admittedly weak in public speaking
- 10. they underwent organized training
- 11. they had to balance law vs grace
- 12. they each killed a man or authorized the killing of others
- 13. they had someone to speak for them (Aaron, Barnabas)
- 14. people were suspicious of them (Israelites complained, Christians wouldn't accept Paul)
- R.C.H. Lenski writes, "Paul's career began, like that of Moses, with flight and with a long period of waiting, waiting, nothing but waiting."

### Comparisons: Hating (Refusing to Believe) the Truth

Comparisons: Enduring suffering to save their people

#### Moses:

By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter. He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin.

Hebrews 11:24-25

When the Israelites made the golden calf to worship, God told Moses He would destroy the people and make Moses the father of a new nation. But Moses pled for the people and God relented.

#### Paul:
