Isaiah 7:10 records the only place in the Bible where a prophet offered a human being the opportunity to name the sign.



Pearls from the Prophets

Pearl Facts – and Lessons! (1)

We have all heard that pearls come from oysters. But to find a pearl in a wild oyster you would have to crack into hundreds of oysters, as pearls are a very rare discovery. A natural wild pearl in an oyster may also be very small as it takes years for an oyster to grow a large, jewelry quality pearl.

Pearl oysters belong to the pinctada family while the oysters we eat are part of the ostreidae family. Pinctada oysters are found deep in the ocean while the tasty oysters we like to eat are typically found on the shore.

Oysters have an internal organ called a mantle which processes minerals in the oyster's food in order to create nacre which makes up the oyster's shell. If a foreign substance, like a grain of sand, gets stuck in the oyster's mantle, the oyster will cover the irritant with a layer of nacre. Then it will add another layer and another layer until it gets so thick that it creates a pearl.

Pearls from the Prophets (2)

Pearl Facts – and Lessons! (2)

Oyster pearl farms exist throughout the world and if you own a pearl necklace or bracelet, chances are the pearls came from one of these farms. That doesn't mean cultivated pearls are any less amazing though - that pearl was still grown inside and oyster! Nature is amazing!

While oyster pearls are beautiful on their own, they also have a delightful significance. The idea that an irritant can be turned into a precious gem is the story which has made oyster pearls timeless. If there is an annoyance or a bother in your life such as the grain of sand in an oyster, simply coat it in a layer of love. Add another layer of patience and another layer of acceptance and continue on until that which annoys you becomes something beautiful.



The Purpose of This Class

The prophets paved the path to establish Jesus as the Christ

Perspective on Prophecy, the Bible, and the Truth

The Bible:

It is what we have to study.
It is the story of an infinite God

communicating with finite man.

We must not become ill if we cannot digest it all in one big gulp.

We must not lose our way in the incomplete detail

in the incomplete details and apparent disconnects.

Our ability to understand prophecy is limited to how it is revealed to us.

God wanted His people to change, and gave them near-term prophesy; but it pointed to long-term fulfillment many times as well

This is not a intensive study course on the prophets - we are merely picking some of the pearls.

Perspective on Prophecy, the Bible, and the Truth

The Old Testament prophets constantly had to condemn "false" or "improper" worship.

Jesus essentially spoke the same message in John 4:24 when He stated that we must worship God in Spirit and Truth.

God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth."

Interesting Notes

Early Prophetic History

Initially books of this kind were transcribed on leather or parchment scrolls (see Jer 36:4, Ezek 2:8-10).

Such scrolls were typically of a certain length, not too long, nor too short.

Each of the longer books (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel) represents approximately the amount of writing that could easily be contained on one of these scrolls.

The shorter books too were originally written on scrolls, not individually, however, but together on a single scroll.

Because there are twelve of them, they were known as the Book (or Scroll) of the Twelve.

Initially then, there were four prophetic scrolls: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and the Scroll of the Twelve.

Meet the Prophets; John W. Miller

Interesting Notes

In Israel there was a tradition of Spirit-filled "ecstatic" prophets, men like Samuel, Elijah, Jehu, Gad, Nathan and Obadiah. ...

These prophets lived on the love offerings of the people.

The tradition was eventually corrupted, and prophet "unions" were formed to legislate standardized prophets' fees. ...

God raised up a new prophetic movement, referred to as the "poetic" prophets, which included Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Daniel and Amos.

Often these new prophets were not a part of the official prophetic clergy (Amos 7: 13-14).

Their prophecies employed poetry and puns, and they often pronounced God's judgment on the unionized prophets (Jeremiah 23: 9-40).

Interesting Notes

In some cases, a prophet (or a group of prophets) was "possessed by the Spirit of God" in an ecstatic trance of some sort (1 Sam 19:18-24).

During such an experience, the prophetic figure did not behave as he normally did, but acted "like another man" (1 Sam 10:6).

Perhaps this condition was similar to that which the apostle Paul experienced, which he described as being "caught up to the third heaven" (2 Cor 12:1-10).

Interesting Notes

Zion was an ancient name for the oldest part of Jerusalem on its southeast ridge, a name apparently going back to times before David's conquest of Jerusalem (2 Sam 5:7).

Solomon enlarged the Zion area, extending the name to the new temple area (1 Kgs. 8:1).

Zion thus became the residence or palace of Yahweh, the God of Israel, where people came to worship and sacrifice to him (Ps. 9:11; 76:2).

Interesting Notes

Jesus knew himself to be the Son of God, and that in no merely official or formal sense: he was intensely aware of a constant and peculiarly intimate filial relationship to God.

But he did not usually speak of himself in public as the Son of God; his preferred self-designation was "the Son of Man".

When he stood before the Sanhedrin and the high priest asked him point-blank if he was the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One, he replied in terms which probably meant, "if that is the language which you insist on using, then my answer must be 'Yes'; but if I may choose my own language, this is what I say: 'You shall see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Almighty and coming with the clouds of heaven'" (Mark 14:62).

This is the last recorded occasion on which he used the designation "the Son of Man" and the context with which he supplied it indicates its source.

Interesting Notes

In the vision in which Daniel foresaw the time when the saints of the Most High would receive the kingdom, the saints were associated, ... identified, with "one like a son of man", a man-like figure, who came with the clouds of heaven into the presence of the Eternal God, "the Ancient of Days', to receive from him the world dominion which had hitherto been wielded by pagan empires, portrayed as wild beasts.

To the "one like a son of man " in the vision correspond "the saints of the Most High" in the angelic interpretation (Dan 7:13ff, 18, 27).

Jesus appears to have identified his followers with "the saints of the Most High", as when he said to them, "Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom" (Luke 12:32).

He spoke of himself as "the Son of Man' in the sense of "that (one like a) son of man" who receives the kingdom in Daniel's vision, and promised them that they would share that kingdom with him if they were prepared to drink his cup and be baptized with his baptism (Mark 10:38) – that is, share his suffering.

Interesting Notes

That Jesus regarded the "necessity" of the Son of Man's suffering as something "written" concerning him is plain.

"The Son of Man", he said at the Last Supper, "goes as it is written of him" (Mark 14:21), and he submitted to his captors in Gethsemane with the words, "Let the scriptures be fulfilled" (Mark 14:49).

And while this evidence is derived predominantly from the Gospel of Mark, it is not confined to it.

In a patently non-Markan passage in Luke, where Jesus speaks of the coming day of the Son of Man's manifestation, he adds, "But first he must suffer many things, and be rejected by this generation" (Luke 17:25). ...

Nor should we overlook the independent Johannine tradition, in its distinctive idiom, emphasizing that "the Son of Man must be lifted up" (John 3:14; 8:28; 12:34) – an expression in which his suffering and glory are combined.

Interesting Notes

The Samaritans did not recognize a succession of prophets as the Jews did:

God's last revelation of his will had been granted to Moses, and there would be no further revelation until the prophet like Moses arose.

It is on the prophet like Moses that what is loosely called the Samaritans' "messianic hope" was fixed.

They had nothing to do with the tribe of Judah or a prince of the house of David: they looked for the prophet whom they called the Taheb, the "restorer".

When, therefore, the Samarian woman in John 4:19 perceived that Jesus was a prophet, she may have implied much more than a Jewish speaker would have meant by the same words.





Interesting Notes

It was generally understood throughout the Israelite society that a prophet was to be remunerated for his services to the people (1 Sam 9:6-8; Amos 7:12), just as the preacher in the New Testament church was to be paid for his work (1 Cor 9:4, 7:14; 2 Cor 11:7-12).

In studying the prophetic books, it is important to keep in mind the process by which these books came into being, and so to appreciate better the way in which God preserved His word.

Such an approach helps one avoid making the serious mistake of thinking that the prophetic books were arranged in simple chronological order.

Nonetheless, certain themes appear repeatedly.

Five of the most significant themes are

the remnant,

the sovereignty of God,

the servant,

the Holy One of Israel,

and the Messiah.

The prophetic unit we commonly call "Isaiah 53" actually begins in 52:13.

The passage contains fifteen verses and divides symmetrically into five three-verse sections.

These five sections describe the servant's introduction, the servant's rejection, the servant's suffering, the servant's death, and the servant's triumph.

Interesting Notes

Herbert Wolf, while arguing for single authorship, suggests the terms "First Isaiah" and "Second Isaiah" might be used in much the same way as we refer to "First Timothy" and "Second Timothy."

That is, the two are almost separate works (as 1 and 2 Timothy are), and the terminology provides a useful distinction.

Wolf's suggestion appears useful as long as those who hear the terms are clear on the speaker's intent.

Interesting Notes

Isaiah's contribution to the New Testament also becomes evident when we examine the data. Approximately one out of every seventeen verses contains material that comes directly from Isaiah. The New Testament writers clearly knew the book of Isaiah well. ...

The New Testament writers' use of Isaianic material falls into three categories.

First, New Testament writers point to events in Jesus's life and in the life of the church as directly fulfilling Isaiah's words.

Second, New Testament writers make secondary application of Isaiah's words to situations in Jesus's life or the life of the early church.

Third, New Testament writers use Isaiah's words because his words, while not directly related to the point they are making, nonetheless fit the sense of what they want to say.

Interesting Notes

This concept of substitutionary suffering at God's hand for the sins of others is <u>unique</u> to Isaiah in the Old Testament prophetic corpus.

Servants of God sometimes suffered as they ministered, and God's hand sometimes used suffering as his instrument to mold people into his image.

But no other servant or prophet actually suffered for the sins of the people, taking their punishment and allowing them to go free.

Mis(in)formed Pearls of Prophecy

Lord Kelvin, world-class scientist and Christian

There is nothing new to be discovered in physics now.

All that remains is more and more precise measurement.

1900 (perhaps mis-attributed)

Radio has no future.

X-rays are clearly a hoax.

The aeroplane is scientifically impossible.

But He had great quotes about his belief in God and Christ.

Telephone Limitations

The telephone was not widely appreciated for the first 15 years because people did not see a use for it.

In fact, in the British parliament it was mentioned there was no need for telephones because "we have enough messengers here."

Western Union believed that it could never replace the telegraph. In 1876, an internal memo read: "This telephone has too many shortcomings to be seriously considered as a means of communication."

Even Mark Twain, upon being invited by Alexander Graham Bell to invest \$5 000 in the new invention, could not see a future in the telephone.

People love a failed prophecy, and sometimes work to embellish the truth in the process.

Thomas Watson, Chairman of IBM

I think there is a world market for maybe five computers.

Thomas Watson, chairman of IBM in 1943 (perhaps mis-attributed, concerning a sales estimate for a particular model)

The idea of internally producing a small, affordable computer was at odds with IBM's corporate culture.

One naysayer remarked that

"IBM bringing out a personal computer would be like teaching an elephant to tap dance."

1981

Years before IBM launched the personal computer in 1981, Xerox had already successfully designed and used PCs internally... but decided to concentrate on the production of photocopiers.

Even Ken Olson, founder of Digital Equipment Corporation, said in 1977, "There is no reason anyone would want a computer in their home."

Voltaire, Famous French Philosopher

In 1776, at age 82, Voltaire brought to a culmination his disdain for the Bible when he published <u>The Bible Fully Explained</u>. The two-volume work was Voltaire's commentary on the whole Bible. His purpose in writing was to "make the whole building [of Christianity] crumble." ... Of his massive tome, in which he derided the Bible on every page, he stated, "The subject is now exhausted: the cause is decided for those who are willing to avail themselves of their reason and their lights, and people will no more read this [Bible]."

However, instead of the Bible becoming irrelevant and no longer believed, [continued to] increase in circulation... [Voltaire's] former house, only fifty-eight years after his death, [began to be] used as a storehouse to house Bibles and Gospel tracts, and printing presses he once employed to print his anti-Christian sentiments [were] being used to print Bibles!

"It is hard for you to kick against the goads" (Acts 26:14b)

Automobile Limitations

In the early 20th century a world market for only 4 million automobiles was predicted because: "the world would run out of chauffeurs."

Shortly after the end of World War II (1945), the whole of Volkswagen, factory and patents, was offered free to Henry Ford II.

He dismissed the Volkswagen Beetle as a bad design.

Today, more than 70 million motorcars are produced every year.

The Beetle became one of the best-selling vehicles of all time.

Railroad Limitations

Irish scientist, Dr. Dionysius Lardner (1793 – 1859) didn't believe that trains could contribute much in speedy transport.

He wrote: "Rail travel at high speed is not possible, because passengers 'would die of asphyxia' [suffocation]."

Today, trains reach speeds of over 300 mph.

Movie and Television Limitations

In 1927, H.M. Warner, of Warner Brothers, asked, "Who the xxxx wants to hear actors talk?"

In 1936, Radio Times editor Rex Lambert thought "Television won't matter in your lifetime or mine."

Solid State Limitations

After the invention of the transistor in 1947, several US electronics companies rejected the idea of a portable radio.

Apparently it was thought nobody would want to carry a radio around.

When Bell put the transistor on the market in 1952 they had few takers apart from a small Japanese start-up called Sony.

They introduced the transistor radio in 1954.

Other Predictions about the Future of Science

In 1894, A.A. Michelson, who with E.W. Morley seven years earlier experimentally demonstrated the constancy of the speed of light, said that the future of science would consist of "adding a few decimal places to the results already obtained."

Perhaps the guy who got it wrong most was the commissioner of the US Office of Patents: in 1899, Charles H. Duell, assured President McKinley that "everything that can be invented has been invented."

Remember that Einstein developed the ideas that revolutionized all of physics while working in the Swiss patent office by 1905.

Music Predictions

In 1954, a concert manager fired Elvis Presley, saying, "You ought to go back to driving a truck."

In 1962, Decca Records rejected the Beatles, "We don't like their sound, and guitar music is on the way out."

Social Predictions

In 1966, Time Magazine predicted,
"By 2000, the machines will be producing so much
that everyone in the U.S. will, in effect,
be independently wealthy."

Presidential Election Predictions

1864 – "Mr. Lincoln is already beaten. He cannot be re-elected."

Horace Greely

Lincoln beat McClellan by a margin of 212 electoral votes to 21.

1936 – "FDR will be a one-term president"

Mark Sullivan

"The race will not be close at all... I'll stake my reputation as a prophet on it."

William Randolph Hearst

FDR beat Landon by a margin of 523 electoral votes to 9.

Most elections produce such bold predictions – that turn out to be completely wrong!

The Great Canals

[Suez]

A most futile attempt and totally impossible to be carried out.

Benjamin Disraeli (1858)

The first vessel sailed through the Suez Canal November 17, 1869.

[Panama – begun in 1881 by the French, who sold their claim after completing one-quarter of the work]

The Panama Canal is actually a thing of the past, and Nature in her works will soon obliterate all traces of French energy and money expended ...

Scientific American, 1891

The US purchased the French claims and completed the waterway, which was opened to shipping in 1914.

Entertainment Technology

[Who'll Pay a Whole Nickel to See Moving Pictures?]

[My] invention ... can be exploited for a certain time as a scientific curiosity, but apart from that it has no commercial value whatsoever.

August Lumiere (French co-inventor of the Lumiere motion-picture camera), 1895

[No One Will Pay a Quarter to Hear Talking Pictures!]

The talking motion picture will not supplant the regular silent motion picture. ... There is such a tremendous investment to pantomime pictures that it would be absurd to disturb it....

Thomas Alva Edison after the first public demonstration of his newly invented talking picture machine, 1913

The Phonograph ... is not of any commercial value.

Thomas Alva Edison (inventor of the phonograph), remark to his assistant, 1880

Communication Technology

[The Telegraph]





Proposed the concept of geo-synchronous orbits for communication satellites in 1945

A geostationary orbit, is a circular geosynchronous orbit 22,236 mi in altitude above Earth's equator and following the direction of Earth's rotation.

An object in such an orbit has an orbital period equal to Earth's rotational period, and so to ground observers it appears motionless, in a fixed position in the sky.

Communications satellites are often placed in a geostationary orbit so that Earth-based satellite antennas (located on Earth) do not have to rotate to track them but can be pointed permanently at the position in the sky where the satellites are located.


Weather satellites are also placed in this orbit for real-time monitoring and data collection, and navigation satellites to provide a known calibration point and enhance GPS accuracy.

Perpetual Motion Machines

The history of perpetual motion machines dates at least back to the Middle Ages. For millennia, it was not clear whether perpetual motion devices were possible or not, but modern theories of thermodynamics have shown that they are impossible. Despite this, many attempts have been made to construct such machines, continuing into modern times.

- a wheel spinning on its axle powered by lodestones; 8th-century
- drawing of a perpetual motion machine appeared in 13th-centur
- Leonardo da Vinci made a number of drawings of devices he hoped would make free energy, but was generally against such devices
- Georg Andreas Böckler designed a self-powered water mill in 1686
- Johann Bessler claimed to have experimented with 300 perpetual motion models before developing what he said were working models (1712)
- the Royal Academy of Sciences in Paris stated in 1775 that they would no longer accept or deal with proposals concerning perpetual motion.
- Many shysters raised money fraudulently using fake machines
- In 1900, Nikola Tesla claimed to have discovered an abstract principle on which to base a perpetual motion machine
- Popular Science, in October 1920, published an article on the lure of this

Perpetual Motion Machines



Bob Propst — The Office Cubicle

While working as a consultant for Herman Miller in the 1960s, Bob Propst introduced America to the open plan office and with it, the office cubicle.

It was designed to "give knowledge workers a more flexible, fluid environment than the rat-maze boxes of offices."

Companies saw his invention as a way to save money, doing away with individual offices and replacing them with open plans and cubicles.

Propst came to lament his invention. "The cubiclizing of people in modern corporations is monolithic insanity," he said.


Mis(in)formed Pearls of Prophecy

Dmitri Mendeleev — The Periodic Table (seeing the pattern)

Dmitri Mendeleev, a Russian chemist from the late nineteenth century, predicted the modern-day periodic table nearly perfectly. When he began his research in 1863, scientists only knew about 60 or so elements. We've since discovered more than 40 more.

By organizing elements' atomic weight and various properties, Mendeleev started to see patterns. He noted the gaps in the table and predicted elements that would likely fill them in the missing places.

For example, Mendeleev foresaw the addition of germanium, which wasn't discovered until 1886.

- 1) Sometimes New Testament writers quote from the Hebrew text of the Old Testament
- 2) ... in the majority of cases, the New Testament quotes the Septuagint (LXX) text
- 3) Sometimes the New Testament writer quotes neither the Hebrew text nor the LXX, but either gives another text or paraphrases the Old Testament text in his own words
- 4) Sometimes the New Testament quotes passages as being from an Old Testament prophet, but which are not found among his writings ... (example Matthew 2:23 "He shall be called a Nazarene" ... This is not to imply that he did not speak it orally, however.

A careful study of the contexts of OT passages quoted in the NT indicates that usually the NT writer gives a new meaning to the OT quotation.

There are basically four categories of quotations...

- 1) NT writers apply OT passages to Christ and Christianity which occurred before the Old Testament writers referred to them... ["them" meaning Christ...]
- 2) New Testament writers apply Old Testament statements to Christ which were taking place at the same time that the Old Testament writers lived...
- 3) New Testament writers apply Old Testament statements to Christ which were predictions when the Old Testament writers uttered them, but were fulfilled long before Christ came...
- 4) Sometimes, two different New Testament writers or speakers apply the same Old Testament passage to different situations...

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Here and throughout, we should avoid any suggestion that the Old Testament and its 'religion' or 'theology' was somehow 'bad' and that the Christian dispensation is somehow a 'replacement'.

The author is stressing that Israel's scriptures always looked ahead and saw the key elements of Israel's life as forward-looking signposts, recognizing that when you arrive at your destination you don't need the signposts any more, not because they were bad but because they have done their job.

... scripture itself points beyond itself.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Prophets evolved as the threat grew – false gods which led to nowhere.

The prophets were speaking to people in life-or-death situations.

Consider that these promises were a structure to build upon.

The prophets spoke truth to power.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Sometimes groupings of prophetic messages and historical events were made chronologically and sometimes topically.

Often the reasons for gathering certain passages into a unit are very obvious, but other times such a determination is difficult, almost impossible.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

... Paul and John in their respective epistles direct that prophetic utterances in church must be intelligently evaluated and accepted only if their testimony to Christ is unexceptionable –

Paul insisting on the acknowledgment that Jesus is Lord (1 Corinthians 12:1-3) and John on the confession of his real incarnation (1 John 4:1-3).

A major Jewish argument against Christ and Christianity was that they had no authority for their existence in the sacred scriptures, which was (to the Jews) the Old Testament. It was primarily to meet this opposition that the early church used the Old Testament to justify their existence.

Consider how the New Testament interprets the Old Testament

The New Testament writers used the Old Testament in so many different ways that no one simple explanation can account for all the passages which must be studied.

... these inspired men did not feel compelled to give an exact quote of biblical material from a particular version in order to use that material.

Evidently, they worked on the principle that basic truths are more important than exact quotations.

John T. Willis

Consider the inability of God to be reduced to such exact quotations (no common language) rather than understanding his true nature.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Consider how the New Testament interprets the Old Testament

The New Testament nowhere states explicitly how it uses the passages it quotes from the Old Testament.

Therefore, the only way to determine this is to examine each passage quoted in its Old Testament context, and each New Testament passage in which an Old Testament text is quoted.

... Since the New Testament does not state how it uses the Old Testament, one must avoid insisting dogmatically that one explanation must be adopted to the exclusion of all others.

John T. Willis

The story of Christ was imbedded in the fabric of the Bible and its prophecies, and when it actually appeared it was totally unexpected in character.

Psalms is quoted seventy-nine times. (in Isaiah)

This illustrates the strong connection between the prophet Isaiah and the "Scriptures".

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

What is really meant by prophecy being fulfilled? (1)

Positively, the early church affirmed that the noblest hopes and aspirations expressed in the Old Testament, while they were realized in a limited way in certain outstanding Old Testament figures, have been realized in a full and complete way only in Christ.

Christ and the early Christians used the word "fulfil" ... to convey this idea.

It is true that sometimes they used this word to affirm that a direct prediction concerning Christ was literally fulfilled, but ... this was not what they had in mind.

Rather, they often used the word "fulfil" when referring to an Old Testament passage which originally had nothing to do with Christ directly, but which the early church saw as a parallel or an antitype (or something similar) to some event or truth concerning Christ.

Rather, it is about whether people believe the gospel and whether they have internalized the gospel to such an extent that they share their resources with the poor in a way that imitates Christ.

The pattern is Jesus.

Scripture is no less inspired and authoritative because it is seen to have passed through many processes before it arrived at its present form.

To assume, as some did in the past, that analysis of the books of Scripture into their sources and examination of the process of compiling and editing casts doubt on their inspiration is a fallacy.

Behind all the long processes by which Scripture was written down we see even more clearly the guiding hand of God.

He did not dictate inerrantly to one person.

He used a host of people and many media to reveal Himself and His purposes to mankind.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Consider the portal given in Romans 1:19-20 for what may be known about God is plain to them:

For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities – His eternal power and divine nature – have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made.

Arguably – God's revelation through creation is a revelation with completely different characteristics than that of His written word. There is no "loss in translation" discussion when pondering in the Andromeda Galaxy or the miracle of birth.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

If we stand very close to a mosaic, we will see little pieces of whatever makes it up - pebbles, chunks of glass, shards of pottery, bits of metal.

As we back away from it, looking at more of the whole instead of scrutinizing the parts, we will experience a moment in which the image created by all these little pieces suddenly "pops" out of the background into our vision.

I fear that some of what the Bible does say about beauty, though not necessarily using that word, has been screened out by the rather severe traditions of reading and studying scripture that have gone looking for dogma rather than delight.

If you spend your time asking whether the second half of the book of Exodus came from a fourth-century source rather than a tenth-century one and worrying about which bits of text were imported by a later redactor, you may be focusing on the wrong thing.

You would be like someone going into a wonderful art gallery and concentrating on the different types of picture frames.

[God Will Establish Fellowship with His People (Isaiah 25:6–7)]

Isaiah described the intimate fellowship the Lord would establish with his people.

The reference to Yahweh as "the LORD almighty" or "LORD of hosts" stresses God's power and ability to make it happen.

The Lord would prepare a banquet for his people such as the world had never seen.

Many interpreters link Isaiah's vision with the apostle John's vision of the wedding supper of the Lamb (Revelation 19:6–9).

[Identity of the servant in Isaiah 49:3, "You are my servant, Israel" (1)]

How can Israel have a mission to itself (Isaiah 49:5–6)?

For this reason, many interpreters have looked beyond the simplest understanding of the term "Israel." One option is to understand the servant as the Messiah. Certainly much of the language of the passage fits the New Testament description of Jesus.

First, the clear parallel between the sword imagery of Isaiah 49:2 and Revelation 19:15 has been noted above.

Second, the servant's discouragement may parallel Jesus's marveling at the people's unbelief (Mark 6: 6), as well as his painful psychological struggles in the Garden of Gethsemane and on the cross (Matthew 27:46; Luke 22:39–46; Hebrews 5:7–10).

Third, the servant's description as "despised and abhorred" (Isaiah 49:7) parallels Isaiah 53:3, as well as the Gospel narratives that highlight Jesus's rejection by many.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

[Identity of the servant in Isaiah 49:3, "You are my servant, Israel" (2)]

Fourth, the concept of the servant taking God's message of salvation to the ends of the earth fits the concept of Jesus's sacrifice, which covers the sins of all who place their faith in him, as well as his commission to his disciples (Matthew 28:18–20; Acts 1:8). ...

Biblical evidence also supports understanding the servant as the faithful remnant of Israel.

During the apostle Paul's first missionary journey, he and Barnabas testified of Jesus to their audience at Antioch of Pisidia (Acts 13:14–50).

They cited themselves as the fulfillment of Isaiah 49:6; God had commissioned them as a light to the Gentiles (Acts 13:47).

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

All four Gospels (Mt 13:14–15; Mk 4:12; Lk 8:10; Jn 12:40) cite Isaiah 6:9–10 or a portion of it.

Acts 28:26–27 also cites the verses.

The Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) use the verses in similar fashion and apply them to the same historical context, while in John and Acts, the verses address a different situation.

The citations in Matthew and Acts exactly match the Septuagint.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

First, the Old Testament contains doctrinal teaching. ...

Jesus 'fulfilled' it all in the sense of bringing it to completion by his person, his teaching and his work. ...

Bishop Ryle summed it up like this: 'The Old Testament is the Gospel in the bud, the New Testament is the Gospel in full flower.' ...

Second, the Old Testament contains predictive prophecy. ...

Much of it looks forward to the days of the Messiah, and either foretells him in word or foreshadows him in type. Yet this was only anticipation.

Jesus 'fulfilled' it all in the sense that what was predicted came to pass in him. The first statement of his public ministry was, 'The time has come.' ...

Third, the Old Testament contains ethical principles, or the moral law of God.

Jesus 'fulfilled' them in the first instance by obeying them, for he was 'born under the law' and was determined (as he had already told John the Baptist) 'to fulfil all righteousness'.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

... he was challenging the inherited tradition of the centuries and claiming to replace it with his own accurate and authoritative interpretation of God's law.

... In particular, he had not come, he insisted, 'to abolish the Law or the Prophets', but he had come 'to fulfil [plērōsai] them'.

The claim sounds innocent enough until we reflect on its implications.

What he is asserting is that all the statements and predictions of both law and prophets found their fulfilment in him, and that therefore all the lines of the Old Testament witness converged on himself.

He did not think of himself as another prophet or even as the greatest of the prophets, but rather as the fulfilment of all prophecy.

Pointing to the Christ

The offer of living water at the feast of tabernacles, the annual harvest-home, includes an Old Testament reference which has not been identified with certainty.

It is generally agreed that the offer was made against the background of the ceremony of water-pouring which took place on each of the first seven mornings of the festival.

If we retain the Greek wording and render "out of his inmost part will flow rivers of living water" we may find the Old Testament source in those prophecies which foretell a day when, as it is put in Zechariah 14:8, "living water shall flow out of from Jerusalem" – from under the threshold of the temple, says Ezekiel (47:1), "from the house of the Lord", says Joel (3:8).

Consider also the times that others brought water out of a rock, etc., like Moses (and even Samson).

Pointing to the Christ

THE PROPHET [John the Baptist]

When he denied that he was the Messiah or the returning Elijah foretold in Malachi 4:4ff, they said, "Are you the prophet?"

John had no need to say "Which prophet?"

He knew that they meant the prophet like Moses, so he answered "No".

...

... in general the Spirit of prophecy is conceived in the New Testament as the Spirit of messianic prophecy, foretelling through the prophets what was to be fulfilled with the passion and triumph of the Messiah.

Pointing to the Christ

There are two specially important places in the Fourth Gospel where Jesus is hailed as "the prophet".

In John 6:14, after the feeding of the multitude, the people who had seen this "sign" said, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world!"

In John 7:40, after Jesus had stood in the temple court on the last day of the feast of tabernacles and invited those who were thirsty to come to him and receive "living water", some of his hearers said, "This is really the prophet".

Pointing to the Christ - Parallel

On both occasions they meant "the prophet like Moses".

A later rabbi is credited with the observation:

- "As the first redeemer caused manna to descend, ... so will the last redeemer caused manna to descend.
- ... As the first redeemer made a well to rise, ... so will the last redeemer bring up water"
- the first redeemer being Moses

 and the last redeemer the Messiah,
 envisaged in his role as a second Moses,

The biblical reference here, most would agree, is the closing section of the prophecy of Ezekiel (47:1–12).

There, following a long description of the rebuilding of the Temple after the Exile, the prophet describes the river of the water of life flowing out of the Temple and down to the Dead Sea, making it fresh.

It looks as though Jesus is here promising that his followers, those who believe in him and come to him to quench their thirst, will themselves become life carriers, able to quench the thirst of others.

Pointing to the Christ

You know in Colossians 1.15 and 18 when Jesus is called the 'firstborn', does that mean he is like the first created spiritual being in the universe? ...

First, we should note that 'firstborn' was more of a status than an actual birth-order. God calls Israel his firstborn son in several writings (e.g. Ex. 4.22; Jer. 31.9; 4 Ez. 6.58) and this description is also applied to the coming king (Ps. 89.27). The 'firstborn' male of a household was ordinarily the appointed heir, even if he was not an actual biological son of the family but was adopted. ...

Second, if Paul had wanted to describe Jesus as a heavenly being, like an angel, whom God made first, he would have done better to use the words prōtoktistos ('created first') or prōtoplastos ('first made').

Third, I think Paul's main point is that Jesus is the father's delegated authority over both creation (Col. 1.15) and new creation (Col. 1.18). Jesus, in other words, possesses superlative authority over creation and salvation!

They quite literally ransacked the Scriptures for hints and anticipations of the Messiah that they now believed had lived among them in Jesus: his birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension. ...

As these first Christians were avidly reading their Bibles, everywhere they looked they came across anticipations and hints of the Messiah just as Jesus had revealed him. ...

Pointing to the Christ (2)

They delighted in coming across fore-shadowings of the Messiah, reading between the lines, putting two and two together, filling in the blanks, discovering the background of the person they knew as Jesus.

They found a fullness they had not expected as they fashioned and developed a narrative sense of Jesus the Christ.

They now realized the depth and immensity that had been implicit throughout their Bibles for such a long time.

Later, as the Holy Spirit prompted four of them - Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John - to write the story for the next generations, these phrases and fragments of scriptural text were woven into what they were writing.

And Paul, the earliest writer of what later became incorporated in the New Testament, could hardly write a paragraph that didn't echo something from their Hebrew Bibles.

"I will make three booths; one for you, one for Moses, one for Elijah."

... One problem with this statement is that Peter misses the unique identity of Jesus and puts him on par with Moses and Elijah. ...

Matthew and Mark, Luke and John, Paul and others wrote, ... their favorite and most used reference was Psalm 110. ...

Psalm 110 is either quoted or alluded to fifteen times: eight direct quotes and seven allusions. ...

Psalm 110 employs the images of king and priest in such a way that the popular stereotypes were totally reversed. ...

Two sentences in Psalm 110 are statements of direct address from Yahweh, "the LORD," and one of them is addressed to "my lord."

The Christians now understood "my lord" as Jesus. Verse 1 opens the psalm with "The LORD [Yahweh] says to my lord [Jesus]: 'Sit at my right hand, till I make your enemies your footstool."

And then, precisely halfway through the psalm, at verse 4, comes this: "The LORD [Yahweh] has sworn and will not change his mind, 'You [Jesus] are a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek.'" Eugene H. Peterson

[The NT writers saw all the OT as pointing to Jesus Christ (2)]

First, Jesus directly fulfilled the prophetic word.

That is, prophets predicted certain things about his life that came true as they said it would.

... Isaiah 42:1–4: Servant of the Lord quietly brings about God's kingdom.

Matthew 12:18–21: Jesus quietly brings in God's kingdom.

Second, Jesus secondarily fulfilled the prophetic word.

That is, some prophecies had their immediate application in another person or event but later were fulfilled in him. ...

Third, Jesus filled full the prophetic word.

That is, the New Testament writers saw events in Jesus's life and work as paralleling concepts of which the prophets had spoken and hence "filling them full" of meaning.

One day Zion would experience peace; that is the good news of 52:7.

But before peace in this full and final sense could be realized the relationship between God and his people had to be put right.

The problem of their sin had to be dealt with to God's total satisfaction.

And that, as we saw in chapter 53, is what the Servant achieves.

The witnesses in 53:5 are aware that their relationship with God has been fully restored, not by anything they have done, but by what the Servant has done for them: 'the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed'.

Pointing to the Christ

What the word "prophetic" must mean here is that Christ alone perfectly fulfilled the pattern of the way that God works to save the world.

Christ did so by voluntarily suffering what Israel suffered unwillingly and as a just punishment for her sins. Christ alone filled that pattern full, so to speak, and allowed the glory of God to be perfectly revealed through Him.

We remember that at His baptism He had identified Himself with Israel. So the glory of God is really revealed in "Israel" after all (Isaiah 44:23 – 49:3).

This means that Second-Isaiah's picture describing the experience of Israel in Babylon actuated the first movement in the chain reaction which ended only when Christ stepped on to the Cross, and when, as Third-Isaiah and the book of Revelation both understand, God will finally resurrect all things, and create a new heaven and a new earth.

Like Moses, Abraham (Gen 20:7), Aaron (Ex 7:1; Num 12:6), Miriam (Ex 15:20; Num 12:6), and Deborah (Judges 4:4) are called "prophets".

And yet it appears that these individuals (and perhaps Moses himself) were not "prophets" in the same sense as those who were connected with the "prophetic movement" in Israel which originated with Samuel and continued well into the Persian period.

The apostle Peter later said: "And all the prophets who have spoken, from Samuel and those who came afterwards, also proclaimed these days" (Acts 3:24). (This he said just after alluding to Deuteronomy 18:15,19, where Moses is called a "prophet").

In the New Testament church there were "apostles" who did not belong in the same category with the Twelve and Matthias and Paul, such as Barnabas (Acts 14:14), Epaphroditus (Philippians 2:25 – in this verse "apostle" is often translated "messenger" in the English versions)...

The prophetic movement in Israel emerged about the same time as the monarchy, and at first served as a stimulus to the people to resist the dangers which the Philistine invasion posed to Israelite politics and religion, (cf. 1 Sam 7:3-4).

Dynamic Historical Environment – Israel (the Northern Kingdom)

- 805 Assyrian king Adad-nirari III overruns Damascus and Syria Jehoash of Israel takes over territory in Syria After Adad-nirari, Assyria had weak kings, and Israel and Judah grew Jereboam II extended the borders of Israel
- 745 Assyria became powerful again with Tiglath-pileser III Israel declined in power with kings assassinated, civil war, etc. Ahaz, king of Judah, formed an alliance with Assyria He defeated Syria and Israel; and carried off Israelites of Galilee Samaria became a land of intermarriages of mixed peoples
- 727 Tiglath-pileser was succeeded by Shalmanezer V

- 721 Sargon II captured Jerusalem and carried its inhabitants into exile Judah had to pay heavy tribute to Assyria Hezekiah, king of Judah, rebelled (with Babylonian influence) Sennacherib invaded Judah and laid siege to Jerusalem

The world was in dynamic confusion with would-be super-power nations warring to establish control. Israel lived in the midst of this.

Dynamic Historical Environment – General

[The Transition in World Power from Assyria to Babylon]

... shortly after Ashurbanipal's death, the great Assyrian empire began to crumble.

The Scythians and Cimmerians made numerous invasions into the Assyrian domain from the North between 630 and 624 B.C.

Nabopolassar became King of Babylon (626-605 B.C.) and successfully liberated Babylon from Assyrian domination.


To the east, the Medes began to rise in power, and under their King, Cyaxares, they combined forces with the Babylonians in an attempt to throw off Assyrian rule once and for all.

In a series of four major battles, the Assyrians were conquered, and Babylon became the new mistress of the ancient Near Eastern world.

Why Study the Prophets?

Reading the book <u>The Gospel according to God</u>, by John F. MacArthur, made me realize how meaningful the prophecy of Isaiah is to the fact of Jesus being the Christ (our Savior).

Particularly chapters 52-53, even considering a contemporary meaning – this points to the powerful love of a suffering Savior.

The book of Isaiah is sometimes called the "fifth Gospel."

John F. MacArthur

The evidence of copies of the book of Isaiah from the Dead Sea Scrolls that are dated long before the time of Christ give tremendous weight to the prophetic message.

Seeing the Connections – Jesus' Reading (1)

Jesus begins His ministry with a quote from Isaiah as it pertains to Him

[After being tempted by Satan in the wilderness]

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news about him spread through the whole countryside.

He was teaching in their synagogues, and everyone praised him.

He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom.

He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him.

Seeing the Connections – Jesus' Reading (2)

Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written [Is 61:1,2 and Is 58:6]:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down.

The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were fastened on him.

He began by saying to them, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing."

Luke 4:14-21

After he had provided purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven.

Hebrews 1:3

Seeing the Connections

How Should We Study the Prophets?

The emphasis is not so much on how the prophetic literature came into being, but how it relates to and was used by the New Testament writers to show the truth, existence, and purpose of the Christ.

We must be careful about studying the prophets in too much detail, looking too close – this can obscure the real and full message.

We do not want to get into the realm of "analysis paralysis".

We do not want to miss the forest for the trees!

Digging too deeply into the Bible – (like focusing on "different Isaiah's", etc.) is a bit like pursuing an understanding of what goes on in a vacuum-tube television set by examining on only one resistor.

We sometimes divide information on a subject to the point of unrecognizability.

Seeing the Connections

How Should We Study the Prophets?

We must realize that this is a developing story with respect to Israelite history, the messengers (prophets) of God, and the birth of the new Kingdom with Christ as its King.

The Old Testament weaves a tapestry of mostly current or near-term pronouncements that assemble into something much more powerful when viewed from a higher, longer-term perspective.

The people of Israel became tuned into a higher layer of meaning when looking at or studying the scriptures.

This is shown in the way that the Hebrew writer uses quotes from the Old Testament.

Consider the analogy of preparing the soil for the seed, which Jesus used in his parables.

Seeing the Connections

How Should We Study the Prophets?

Prophets prepared the way for Christ, as a farmer plows the fields to get ready for eventual harvest. Looking at a plowed field is difficult to understand the huge bounty that will come, but the clues are there. Jesus used this analogy.

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go. He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.

Luke 10:1-2

As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet: "A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.'

This is the one about whom it is written: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you." Luke 7:27

Seeing the Connections

What does "Scripture" mean in the New Testament

For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart.

Hebrews 4:12

But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it, and how from infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.

2 Timothy 3:14-17

"Scripture" to the New Testament writers related to the Old Testament, though it now has become applicable to the New Testament writers as well.

Seeing the Connections

What does "Scripture" mean in the New Testament

Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation of things.

2 Peter 1:20

[referring to the letters of Paul]

He writes the same way in all his letters, speaking in them of these matters. His letters contain some things that are hard to understand, which ignorant and unstable people distort, as they do the <u>other</u> Scriptures, to their own destruction.

2 Peter 3:16

Peter is apparently treating Paul's letters as equivalent to Scripture

Seeing the Connections

Peter "quotes" from the Gospels

He received honor and glory from God the Father when the voice came to him from the Majestic Glory, saying,

"This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased."

2 Peter 1:17; quoting from Matthew 17:5; Mark 9:7; Luke 9:35

Seeing the Connections

Perception of Prophetic Messages

There is must be a development of understanding – the total truth cannot be presented all at once to people, especially when it concerns such a long-term plan.

Consider that Christ several times tried to tell the disciples about the fact that He would be crucified and in three days He would rise again. [Matthew 12:40; Mark 8:31, 9:31, 10:34; John 2:19-20]

He stated this very clearly, but they did not understand it until after the resurrection.

The only accurate understanding of prophecy is when it is explained by God.

Seeing the Connections

Example of Connectivity

... note that when Jesus and the apostles tried to explain the relationship between Jesus and his people (the church), they simply borrowed figures from the Old Testament which applied to God and Israel.

- Paul told the Ephesians that Christ loved the church as a husband loves his wife (Ephesians 5:22-23).
- Jesus explained that God was the husbandman, he was the vine, and his disciples were the branches. And he warned his disciples that if they did not bear good fruit, they would be cast off and burned (John 15:1-8).
- Jesus told the beautiful parable about a boy who took his father's gifts and spent them on harlots in a far country. But his father never stopped loving him, and when the young man returned home, his father welcomed him and accepted him back into his full favor (Luke 15:11-32).

A knowledge of the Old Testament helps greatly to fully appreciate such New Testament illustrations and ideas.

Seeing the Connections

Why Study the Prophets?

Consider the work of the prophets as a type of connecting tissue, which ties together the different pieces of God's message by linking people who lived in one time to events which occur at a different time – some / many beyond their own lifespan.

Think of God not being bound by time, and prophecy provides glimpses of His perspective and providence.

PDE

Consider analogies of the parts of the body working together to accomplish the purpose of the whole:

- 1 Corinthians 12:12ff; unity and diversity in the body
- Ephesians 4:15-16; the whole body joined by ligaments
- Colossians 2:19; held together by ligaments and sinews


OT Quote Occurrences in the NT - Overview









OT Quote Occurrences in the NT (Romans)





Pearls of Great Price

In our study of the prophets and their messages, we will be hunting for Pearls that are of immense value!

Pearls of Great Price

Dipping into Isaiah at random and picking out a verse here and there is of little value for an understanding of the Book of Isaiah as the Word of God.

... if we are ever to understand Isaiah and his mind, it is important for us to discover just what king, or which historical incident, Isaiah refers to if we are to see how the Word was "becoming flesh" even in the days before the birth of Christ.

Even though we may miss much of the complete historical meaning, we will still go searching for pearls!

There are also many other interesting passages that we will not include in this study.

These pearls are not necessarily prophecies directly related to Christ, but themes that are very meaningful to us.

Picking the Pearls

Too many of us tend to skim over or otherwise ignore / pay less attention to the words of the prophets, so hopefully this study can freshen our outlook on this part of OT literature.

The intricate historical and linguistic details will be left to the references that I list.

In my preparation I have found that there are too many pearls to cover in a single class series, so we will leave some out, but plan to teach this in (at least) two sessions.

Isaiah is divided into two sections, the first containing thirty-nine chapters and the second twenty-seven chapters.

The Bible also is divided into two sections: the thirty-nine books of the Old Testament and the twenty-seven books of the New.

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah - Introduction

That second major division of Isaiah begins and ends exactly where the New Testament begins and ends.

It opens with the ministry of John the Baptist (Isa. 40:3–5), as does the New Testament (Matt. 3:3; Mark 1:3; Luke 3:4–6; John 1:23).

It concludes with the new heavens and the new earth (Isa. 65:17; 66:22), which is also how the New Testament ends (Revelation 21–22).

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah - Introduction

Even the backslidden people of Judah in Isaiah's time were not convinced they needed that kind of redeemer.

They were hoping instead for a powerful political figure.

They wanted a conquering messiah who would vindicate the Jewish people, liberate the nation from their earthly oppressors, and elevate Israel to world dominance politically and militarily.

This period after the return was a period of great literary activity and of the careful editing of material that had come from the heroic days of the past. By this time papyrus scrolls had become available on the market. The papyrus plant, which grows well in the delta of the Nile, produces long narrow leaves, which can be dried and glued together in strips to form a very useful writing material. Egypt was now marketing this writing material. Egypt was now marketing this writing material in standard lengths.

It is obvious that the Gospels of Matthew, Luke, and John are of the length they are, because they conform very closely to the length of a standard scroll. Mark, again, as we know, is not complete; at one time, before its end was lost, it must have filled a standard scroll and occupied about the same length of papyrus as the other Gospels. The whole Book of Isaiah would just fill nicely two of those standard scrolls.

To conclude the story of the book's composition we are to recall that, in the centuries immediately preceding the Christian era, the more expensive material known as vellum was coming on the market, and came to be used especially for the preservation of sacred literature.

Vellum was made of the prepared skins of animals. These were then cut to size and stitched together to form lengths similar to those in which papyrus could be obtained.

A still later writing material is known to us by the word "Codex". The latter comprised polished sheets of vellum stitched together much in the shape of a modern book.

The so-called "St. Mark's Isaiah", however, one of the first Dead Sea Scrolls to be discovered, and which originated from the second century before Christ, is still written on sections of vellum stitched together to form a scroll.

In this manuscript "Isaiah" is copied in a clear hand, in columns working from right to left, the columns each occupying an area much the same as that of the printed space on the page of a modern book.

"Isaiah" must then have been complete and in its present form well before the second century B.C.

The promise "a remnant will return" is a word-play on the name of Isaiah's first son, Shear-jashub (see 7:3).

John T. Willis

Willis gives this the near-term meaning: if you don't trust in the Lord, only a remnant of Judah's army will return from the battle.

'Shear- Jashub' means 'a remnant shall return' or 'a remnant shall repent'.

Both are possible, but since the immediate context here is one of faith versus unbelief rather than exile and return, the latter meaning is almost certainly the primary one.

A very near-term prophecy with a long-term meaning as well (a remnant will return from captivity).

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 7

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, "Ask the Lord your God for a sign, whether in the deepest depths or in the highest heights." (10,11)

But Ahaz said, "I will not ask; I will not put the Lord to the test." (12)

Then Isaiah said, "Hear now, you house of David! Is it not enough to try the patience of humans? Will you try the patience of my God also? (13)

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: "The virgin [or young woman] will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel [God with us].

He will be eating curds and honey when he knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, for before the boy knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, the land of the two kings you dread will be laid waste.

The Lord will bring on you and on your people ... the king of Assyria." (14-17)

But after he had considered this,
an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said,
"Joseph son of David,
do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife,
because what is conceived in her
is from the Holy Spirit.

She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet:

"The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

Matthew 1:20-23

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 7

The statement "before the child (Immanuel) knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good" (verse 16) refers to food, not to ideas or morals. Verse 15 supports this. "He shall eat curds and honey when he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good." In other words, verses 15-16 do not mean that by the time that Immanuel "reaches the age of responsibility" (say approximately twelve), Pekah and Rezin will no longer be a threat.

Now the reason this little two-year-old child, Immanuel will select "curds and honey" is that by the time (approximately three years after Isaiah gave the sign – 732 B.C.) the land would be so devastated by the Assyrian invasion that only curds and honey would be available to the few who would be left, as verses 21-22 make clear.

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 7

... there is no reason why 'alma cannot mean a "young woman" of marriageable age in the Hebrew text of Isaiah 7:14, and mean a "virgin" in the New Testament Greek, which follows the Septuagint (LXX).

John T. Willis

The birth of Jesus was definitely a virgin birth, as attested to by:

Luke 1:34

(not just called a "virgin",

but Mary knew she had not been with a man).

Consider: how could the people of Isaiah's time understand the meaning of a prediction such as that of a <u>virgin</u> birth?

But after the fact and with the proof of Christ (especially His resurrection) that meaning could be understood with a higher-level of significance.

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 7

[The virgin in Isaiah 7]

"Immanuel" means "God is with us" – right here, now, not just in heaven, but here ... at this important juncture in Israel's history.

And the new baby would be a constant reminder of the fact.

God had made that promise long ago when he appeared to Moses and said: "But I will be with you" (Exodus 3:12).

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 8

The Lord said to me,

"Take a large scroll and write on it with an ordinary pen:

Maher-Shalal-Hash-Baz

["the spoil speeds, the prey hastens", or

"quick to the plunder, swift to the spoil"]." (1)

So I called in Uriah the priest and Zechariah son of Jeberekiah as reliable witnesses for me. (2)

Then I made love to the prophetess, and she conceived and gave birth to a son. (3a)

And the Lord said to me, "Name him Maher-Shalal-Hash-Baz.

For before the boy knows how to say 'My father' or 'My mother,' the wealth of Damascus and the plunder of Samaria will be carried off by the king of Assyria." (3b-4)

Isaiah – Similarities between the Two Signs (John T. Willis)

These similarities show that these two signs meant the same thing, namely,

that within a short time Pekah and Rezin would no longer be a threat to Ahaz, but if (or since) Ahaz sent to Tiglath-pileser III for help in the end he and Judah would be hurt.

Consider: This is somewhat like the two of Pharaoh's dreams as interpreted by Joseph – they had the same ultimate meaning.

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Similarities between the Two Signs (John T. Willis)

[When Hezekiah was visited by Babylonian emissaries]

Isaiah saw that Merodach-baladan II had a much deeper purpose in mind – rebellion against Assyria.

Isaiah knew that this was a prelude to disaster (not relying solely on God for protection.)

The Lord Almighty is the one you are to regard as holy, he is the one you are to fear, he is the one you are to dread.

He will be a holy place; for both Israel and Judah he will be a stone that causes people to stumble and a rock that makes them fall.

John Willis shows an argument that the words in Isaiah 9:6 represent a single name.

This is a little difficult to believe in a name that compound and long.

Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end.

establishing and upholding it
with justice and righteousness

Here it may be noted that the New Testament nowhere applies Isaiah 9:6-7 to Christ, nor does the New Testament apply any of the four titles in this passage to Christ.

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 9

[Isaiah 9:7]

The Christian Standard Bible (CSB) says,

"The dominion will be vast, and its prosperity will never end."

That is a fine translation, but perhaps more dynamic is the more famous KJV:

"Of the <u>increase</u> of his government and peace there shall be no end" (emphasis added).

What is the "increase" of Christ's government?

How is it that it will never end?

The Hebrew word translated "increase" (or "vast") gives a sense of ever-growing abundance (7:22), of multiplication (Gen 1:28).

[Isaiah 9:7]

So Christ's kingdom will be characterized by the never-ending multiplication of its prosperity.

How can that be true in heaven, especially because there will no longer be babies born or any form of procreation (Matt 22: 30)?

I think that in heaven Christ's subjects will be morally perfect and will not forget anything they have learned; but they will still be learning, constantly growing in their estimation of the greatness of Christ's person and achievements.

In the year that the supreme commander, sent by Sargon king of Assyria, came to Ashdod and attacked and captured it - at that time the Lord spoke through Isaiah son of Amoz.

He said to him, "Take off the sackcloth from your body and the sandals from your feet." And he did so, going around stripped and barefoot.

Then the Lord said, "Just as my servant Isaiah has gone stripped and barefoot for three years, as a sign and portent against Egypt and Cush, so the king of Assyria will lead away stripped and barefoot the Egyptian captives and Cushite exiles, young and old, with buttocks bared - to Egypt's shame.

Isaiah 20:1-4

What an embarrassing object lesson asked of Isaiah by God: Going around naked (wearing some kind of underwear?)

Amazing is that this action was to prophesy against Egypt and Cush.

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 20

Isaiah 20, one of the strangest chapters in the whole book, shows God's command to his prophet, Isaiah, to act out Egypt's humiliation by going around naked and barefoot for three years as a sign against Egypt and Cush.

God worked the image of the forthcoming captivity through this Isaiah's humiliation of nakedness.

Consider the humiliation of David's emissaries to the Ammonites when they had their beards half cut off and their buttocks bared. 2 Sam 10

More importantly, consider the humiliation of Christ, as he was stripped and nailed to the cross, exposed to the people.

[how better to show true love?]

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 20

For the three years of the revolt (713-711) Isaiah had gone about stripped and barefoot, like a disgraced captive (3).

He may have been completely naked or, more likely, barefooted and stripped of his outer clothing.

His feet were certainly bare, and so, probably, were his buttocks (4).

His action was a sign and portent, that is, it was invested with special, divine significance.

It is highly improbable that he remained stripped round the clock, so to speak.

More likely he appeared this way in public at least once each day over the three-year period.

Some people feel the sequence of this Isaiah passage is all turned around and that the highest form of God's help ought to be the soaring of ecstasy. They say it should read, "First you walk, then you run, and finally you mount up with wings as an eagle." But I think the writer knew what he was doing when he set down the promises as he did, for in the dark stretches of life, the most difficult discipline of all is not that of soaring or even of running. It consists of "keeping on keeping on" when events have slowed you to a walk, when it seems that in spite of everything you are going to crumple under the load and faint away.

"Touch no unclean thing" (52:11) would certainly include the whole Babylonian system of idolatry and occult practices that had helped to ruin the Jewish nation (47:11–15). Paul made the application to believers today in 2 Corinthians 6:14-7:1.

and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood?

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 58

[True Fasting / True Worship]

The Lord will <u>guide you always</u>; he will <u>satisfy your needs</u> in a sun-scorched land and will strengthen your frame.

You will be like a well-watered garden, like a spring whose waters never fail.

Isaiah 58:11

This comment on "false" fasting is a warning to us all.

We must worship God from the heart – in spirit and in truth.

Your people will rebuild the ancient ruins and will raise up the age-old foundations; you will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings.

The rebuilding of ancient ruins is a clear allusion to the rebuilding of Jerusalem by the exiles, but it is also a metaphor for the building of a work for the glory of God that will last eternally – even the building of the heavenly temple of God with living stones rescued [see 1 Peter 2:5] from the wreckage of Satan's devastation (Matt 16:18; 1 Pet 2:5).

So justice is driven back, and righteousness stands at a distance; truth has stumbled in the streets, honesty cannot enter. The image is that these characteristics are like people being pushed around by a bully.

Truth is nowhere to be found, and whoever shuns evil becomes a prey.

The Lord looked and was displeased that there was no justice.

[The Rejection of God by People]

God steps in – through the Messiah

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor [in spirit].

Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down.

What an explosive way to launch his ministry!

The idea of "preaching good news to the poor" is also found in Matthew 11:5 and Luke 7:22

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 61 (FFB 1)

When the imprisoned John the Baptist sent his messengers to ask Jesus if he was the Coming One after all, or if they had to look for someone else, he was perhaps disturbed by the discrepancy between the purifying judgment by wind and fire which he had said the Coming One would execute and the ministry in which Jesus was actually engaged.

When Jesus told John's messengers to go back and tell their teacher what they had seen him do and heard him say – "the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, the poor have good news preached to them" (Luke 7:22) – he knew that John would recognize the fulfilment of those prophetic words of Isa. 35:5ff and similar scriptures which foretell how on the day of Yahweh's saving action "the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then shall the lame man leap like a hart and the tongue of the dumb sing for joy."

Picking the Pearls

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 61 (FFB 2)

Above all, the proclamation of the good news to the poor or afflicted was a sign that the year of Yahweh's favour had come, according to the announcement of the Spirit-anointed speaker of Isa. 61:1ff, which (as we are told in Luke 4:17-19) Jesus chose as his text and applied to his ministry in his programmatic sermon in the synagogue of Nazareth.

Isaiah – Pearls from chapter 61

[Good news for the poor (61:1–6)]

The Servant-Messiah speaks as an anointed preacher, and the burden of his preaching is the year of the LORD's favor (2).

This is almost certainly an allusion to the Year of Jubilee as described in the law of Moses.

Every fiftieth year was to be proclaimed a year of release in which debts were cancelled, slaves were freed, and people who had been forced to sell their family property because of poverty received it back again.

It was called the 'Year of Jubilee', literally 'Year of the Ram's Horn', because of the horn trumpet which was blown to announce its arrival.

As in the Jubilee, our debts are cancelled, and we have a fresh start!

[Isaiah 65:17-25] All of this amazing peace and prosperity is common in the language of prophetic writing. Yet these words are among the most controversial in the book of Isaiah. The difficulty lies in trying to harmonize the images in these nine verses with other passages of Scripture, most especially the teaching about the new heaven and new earth in 2 Peter 3 and Revelation 21–22. John's vision in Revelation of the new heaven and new earth includes the death of death. But in Isaiah 65:20 we have merely the deferral of death, resulting in remarkably long life: ...

To make matters more confusing, that verse contains two other things we would not expect in the eternal state: infants born and people being accursed. No one will suffer under a curse in heaven, and heavenly marriage and procreation are ruled out by Jesus's statement to the Sadducees in Matthew 22: 30.

Isaiah 65:25 provides a literary "flashback" to Isaiah 11:6.

Isaiah linked his description of the new heavens and the new earth with his earlier description of God's kingdom.

And so as we come to the end of Isaiah, we discover that the prophet begins and ends with Yahweh, the sovereign Lord of history.

The vision Isaiah received (1:1) came from God, and at the end of Isaiah's prophecy, all nations recognize God's supremacy either willingly or unwillingly (66: 23–24).

Not only is history going somewhere, but fundamentally, history is not about humanity but about the God of humanity, the God of the universe.

The apostle Paul's words provide an excellent summary of Isaiah's message: "For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him be the glory forever! Amen." (Rom 11:36)

Resurrection

We do not have to press deep into the Old Testament before discovering that there is a confident and constant hope in God's love for his people even beyond the veil of death. ... So, on the one hand, the hope of the biblical writers, which was strong and constant, focused not upon the fate of humans after death, but on the fate of Israel and its promised land. The nation and land of the present world were far more important than what happened to an individual beyond the grave. But on the other hand, the constant love of YHWH was never merely a theological dogma to the ancient Israelites. In many parts of their literature, and supremely the Psalms, we find evidence that they knew this love in vivid personal experience. It gave rise to the suggestion that, despite the widespread denials of such a thing, YHWH's faithfulness would after all be known not only in this life but also in a life beyond the grave.

[The Resurrection of Christ]

Now, brothers and sisters, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, which you received and on which you have taken your stand.

For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins <u>according to the Scriptures</u>, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day <u>according to the Scriptures</u>...

What kind of body will it be?

Paul describes it as a body (in some physical sense) that is imperishable (as opposed to what we have now).

The exact nature is bound to be beyond our understanding, but somehow a mix of imperishable body which will be the vessel to carry our soul.

We should be able to recognize each other not by physical image, but from the spiritually transparent heart / soul.

The resurrection was the last major topic in Paul's letter we know as First Corinthians (1 Cor 15:12–58).

Paul described the certainty of Christ's resurrection and its impact on all believers - when he returns, they will rise as he did (1 Cor 15:20–22).

Paul assured his readers that in that day, Isaiah's words would come true (1 Cor 15:54).

Death, the last enemy, would be destroyed forever (1 Cor 15:26).
