Catching the Smile of God

Worshipping God in our congregation is always an uplifting experience. As our director, Tommy works so hard to prepare for it, organize it, and lead it so that the entire building is filled with sound. He has a great voice, of course, and he uses his arms and hands dramatically to guide us in tempo, volume, and feeling. Like a windmill pumping water out of the earth, he works to draw true worship¹ from the depths of all of us. And like a mechanic moving a large object with a block and tackle, he uses every bit of leverage he has to raise the entire heart of the congregation. Without him there is no harmony, there is no synchronization, and as a result, we are not able to accomplish our purpose of worship. Without him, there is no meaning, no communication².

An amazing thing occurs sometimes during this part of our worship. Tommy is so caught up in the beauty of the moment that he begins to smile. It makes me feel that we as singers must be doing something right, but more likely it means that we have crossed some invisible threshold into a higher region of worship. He can feel it, and I especially hope that God can as well. And I find myself wondering if this is how the face of God looks as we worship.

I would love to think that God is smiling as He looks down and directs us in following Him. I can imagine Him as His arms sway to and fro with the heartbeat of the universe, His creation, His Kingdom. And as He receives our adoration, He makes His face to shine upon us³. Amazing Grace – He loves us so!

He pays such attention to us, even though the morning stars sing together and the angels shout for joy in His presence⁴. We have a lot of competition. But He rejoices over us with His own singing⁵. It is so interesting to think of God singing over us; we usually think only about our singing to him. We must listen very carefully to hear the rhythms of God. The goal of worship is to make our heartbeat (or "soulbeat") match that rhythm⁶.

It is not about the notes and the sounds, as we all know. Sometimes when the congregation sings, there is someone near me that sings so off-key that I can't tell if I am singing the right notes. But Tommy smiles anyway. And I know that God is smiling, too.
