We know that Christ knocks on the door of our heart so that He can enter. There is nothing more powerful than the sacrifice we are now celebrating to open that door. This memorial points to the love that our Savior bore to the cross, and how His body was broken and His blood shed so that we might live. But sometimes we let Him in and then close the door again. This supper is meant to feed us, like supplying electricity to our house. Christ wants us to keep the door open, so that we can let the glory of Christ shine through. He knocks at that door to get us to open it up again. He wants to be seen in us. We must not quench the Spirit, but as we take this communion, show that Christ is at home in our hearts.

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
