Thought Research Question

Consider significant "remnant" examples prior to the time of the writing prophets?

The remnant concept appears before the prophets.

Noah and his family were a remnant that survived the flood (Gen. 7:1–23).

Lot and his daughters were a remnant that escaped the destruction of Sodom (Gen. 19:29–30).

God told Elijah that a faithful remnant still existed in Israel (1 Kgs. 19:18).

The Israelites were the remnant of those who started out, and endured the 40 years' wandering in the wilderness.

Note: consider the idea of saving a remnant; Joseph, Gen 45:7

Also; Yet in spite of this, when they are in the land of their enemies, I will not reject them or abhor them so as to destroy them completely, breaking my covenant with them. I am the Lord their God.

Leviticus 26:44 (see also Deuteronomy 4:27)

Parallel Processing

Covenant Considerations

[The everlasting covenant (Isaiah 55:3–5)]

All this is explained in verses 3b-5 in terms of an everlasting covenant which will mean the fulfilment of all that was once promised to David.

And, like the earlier covenants, this final covenant will have a sign to confirm it.

The covenant with Noah had the rainbow.

The covenant with Abraham had circumcision, and the Sinai covenant had sprinkled blood.

Appropriately, the final everlasting covenant will have 'an everlasting sign', which will be nothing less than a permanently renewed universe.

The final covenant between God and his people will not cancel out the earlier covenants but fulfil them, perfectly and completely.



Interesting Notes

As John's disciples were leaving, Jesus began to speak to the crowd about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swayed by the wind? If not, what did you go out to see? A man dressed in fine clothes? No, those who wear fine clothes are in kings' palaces. Then what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written:

"'I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.' [Malachi 3:1]

Only one person exceeded Jeremiah in compassion and concern for his people – our Savior and Lord himself.

like his predecessor,
wept over his people.

Jeremiah is described as "The Weeping Prophet" - God also suffers and weeps!

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Interesting Notes

A rivalry existed between the priests and prophets for the conveying of religious truth.

Since he was from a priestly background,

Jeremiah, at first,

tended to side with their approach to worship.

But his disillusionment with the final result of Josiah's reform movement caused him to adopt the prophetic approach.

During the remainder of his life, he functioned as a prophet, not a priest.

Interesting Notes – Praying for Someone

Although most of the many people who came from Ephraim, Manasseh, Issachar and Zebulun had not purified themselves, yet they ate the Passover, contrary to what was written.

But Hezekiah prayed for them, saying,

"May the Lord, who is good, pardon everyone who sets their heart on seeking God - the Lord, the God of their ancestors - even if they are not clean according to the rules of the sanctuary."

And the Lord heard Hezekiah and healed the people.

2 Chronicles 30:18-20

Hezekiah prayed for those who worshipped contrary to the law, though they were truly worshipping (in their heart).

God heard his prayer, and healed the people.

Mercy triumphs over judgment.

[Jesus speaking to his disciples]

You will be betrayed even by parents, brothers and sisters, relatives and friends, and they will put some of you to death.

Everyone will hate you because of me.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

[Spoken through the prophet Isaiah]

Matthew 3:3 40:3 (Describing John the Baptist) "This is he who was spoken of through the prophet Isaiah."

Matthew 8:17 53:4 (Describing Jesus's works of healing) "This was to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet Isaiah." ...

Matthew 12:17–21 42:1–4 (Describing Jesus's healing people and instructing them not to make him known) "This was to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet Isaiah" (Mt 12:17).

Luke 3:4–6 40:3–5 (Describing John the Baptist) "As is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet" (Lk 3:3).

John 12:38 53:1 (Describing the unbelief of many in spite of witnessing ... Jesus's miracles) "This was to fulfill the word of Isaiah the prophet."

Romans 10:20–21 65:1–2 "And Isaiah boldly says" (regarding Israel's current state of unbelief as Paul writes).

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Jeremiah's words were as human as he was, and yet they conveyed the message (the word) God wished to be communicated.

Paul makes a similar claim when he says, 'we speak, not in words taught us by human wisdom but in words taught by the Spirit'.

Peter likewise affirms, 'prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit'.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

[The Unbelief of the Jews (2)]

John suggests that Isaiah's words were fulfilled in the unbelief of the general population.

John adds (John 12:41) that Isaiah said these things because he saw Jesus's coming glory. ...

Bryan Beyer

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Again Jesus called the crowd to him and said, "Listen to me, everyone, and understand this.

Nothing outside a person can defile them by going into them.

Rather, it is what comes out of a person that defiles them."

After he had left the crowd and entered the house, his disciples asked him about this parable. [was this really a parable?]

"Are you so dull?" he asked.

"Don't you see that nothing that enters a person from the outside can defile them?

For it doesn't go into their heart but into their stomach, and then out of the body."

(In saying this, Jesus declared all foods clean.)

Mark 7:14-19

Jesus actually goes "beyond" interpretation, as He leaves behind the rules about clean and unclean animals.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

"But you are not to be called 'Rabbi,' for you have one Teacher, and you are all brothers.

And do not call anyone on earth 'father,' for you have one Father, and he is in heaven.

Matthew 23:8-9

Notice how we "interpret" what Jesus said about using the words "Teacher" and "Father"

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

For us, or everyone?"

[Watchfulness]

"Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning, like servants waiting for their master to return from a wedding banquet, so that when he comes and knocks they can immediately open the door for him. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them watching when he comes. Truly I tell you, he will dress himself to serve, will have them recline at the table and will come and wait on them. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them ready, even if he comes in the middle of the night or toward daybreak. But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him."

Peter asked, "Lord, are you telling this parable to us, or to everyone?"

Luke 12:35-41

Peter interprets this as a parable...

Then he wants to know if the message is a limited one, not for everyone.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

A Warning Against Hypocrisy

"... be on your guard against the yeast of the Pharisees and Sadducees."

Then they understood that
he was not telling them
to guard against the yeast used in bread,
but against the teaching
of the Pharisees and Sadducees.

Matthew 16:11b-12

Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples:

"The teachers of the law and the Pharisees sit in Moses' seat.

So you must be careful to do everything they tell you.

But do not do what they do, for they do not practice what they preach.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

Regarding the Resurrection

Martha answered,
"I know he will rise again
in the resurrection at the last day."

John 11:24

Martha knew about the resurrection,
Most likely from Jesus interpreting the Scriptures

Pointing to the Christ

Jesus, in his eyes, is the antitypical paschal lamb; here at least John is in agreement with Paul: "Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us" (1 Cor. 5:7).

It is doubtful if the title "the Lamb of God", given twice to Jesus by John the Baptist in the Fourth Gospel (John 1:29, 36), has a paschal reference: the Passover lamb was not generally regarded as a sin-offering, whereas the Lamb of God is said to take away the sin of the world. [The blood of the Passover lamb did indeed save the people]

Probably no one Old Testament passage underlines the designation "the Lamb of God"; rather it sums up a number of Old Testament themes, of which the Passover lamb is one – others being the lamb of God's providing spoken of by Abraham (Gen. 22:8) and (more especially) the suffering Servant, led like a lamb to the slaughter and giving his life as a sin-offering (Isa. 53:7, 10).

Consider that our favorite Psalm (23) was not quoted by Jesus.

Pointing to the Christ

The reference to Jesse's line as opposed to David's line makes an important distinction.

Isaiah was not announcing the coming of David's successor; he was announcing the coming of another David.

Other prophetic passages also support this concept (Jeremiah 30:9; Ezekiel 34:23–24; Hosea 3:5).

Pointing to the Christ

I have a feeling that the book of Isaiah was a favorite book of the apostle Paul.

He quoted from it or alluded to it at least eighty times in his Epistles and in at least three of his recorded messages (Acts 13:34, 47; 17:24–29; 28:26–28).

This interest in Isaiah may stem from the fact that Jesus quoted Isaiah 42:7, 16 when He spoke to Paul on the Damascus Road (Acts 26:16–18).

When Jesus encouraged Paul during his ministry to Corinth (Acts. 18:9–10), He referred to Isaiah 41:10 and 43:5.

Paul's call to evangelize the Gentiles was confirmed by Isaiah 49:6.22

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Pointing to the Christ

Kingship (David) and priesthood (Levites)
are two of the great realities of Old Testament Israel's life and faith
that were explicitly declared to be 'forever'–
just as 'forever' as God's covenant with creation itself.

... But we are taught very clearly in the New Testament that their 'forever-ness' is taken up and fulfilled by the kingly and priestly work of Christ.

Another type of duality: king and priest (note that David is also considered a prophet)

Consider the volume of sacrifices at certain times (thousands);
The people were blessed by the meat from the sacrifice,
and so, we are blessed through the more complete sacrifice of Christ.
Also, God takes our sacrifices and turns them into blessings. [Ray]

Pointing to the Christ

[The NT writers saw all the OT as pointing to Jesus Christ (1)]

The law of Moses, the prophets, and the writings all bore witness to his life and work (Lk 24:44). ...

With regard to Jesus and prophecy, the New Testament writers viewed Jesus's life and work as doing one of three things.

First, Jesus *directly fulfilled* the prophetic word.

That is, prophets predicted certain things about His life that came true as they said it would.

Second, Jesus *secondarily fulfilled* the prophetic word. That is, some prophecies had their immediate application in another person or event but later were fulfilled in Him.

Third, Jesus *filled full* the prophetic word.

That is, the New Testament writers saw events in Jesus's life and work as paralleling concepts of which the prophets had spoken and hence "filling them full" of meaning.

Pointing to Jesus

[Belief and Unbelief Among the Jews]

Even after Jesus had performed so many signs in their presence, they still would not believe in him.

This was to fulfill the word of Isaiah the prophet:

"Lord, who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed?"

For this reason they could not believe, because, as Isaiah says elsewhere:

"He has blinded their eyes and hardened their hearts, so they can neither see with their eyes, nor understand with their hearts, nor turn - and I would heal them."

Isaiah 6:10

Isaiah said this because he saw Jesus' glory and spoke about him.

John 12:37-41

Pointing to Christ

Therefore, discussing morality is in fact discussing the nature of God's law and truth, which Jesus famously suggests is found in him:

"I am the way, and the truth, and the life.

No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6).

...

What Jesus is saying explicitly and confrontationally to a Jewish audience very familiar with the Torah is that in him, through him, the life the Torah describes and highlights is available.

He is what the Law and the Prophets point to as the fulfillment of the righteous life of God (Matt. 5:17; 11:13; 22:40).

Pointing to Christ

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!"

So Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. Then Simon Peter came along behind him and went straight into the tomb. He saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the cloth that had been wrapped around Jesus' head. The cloth was still lying in its place, separate from the linen. Finally the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed.

(They still did not understand <u>from Scripture</u> that Jesus had to rise from the dead.)

Why Study the Prophets?

Reading the book <u>The Gospel according to God</u>, by John F. MacArthur, made me realize how meaningful the prophecy of Isaiah is to the fact of Jesus being the Christ (our Savior).

Particularly chapters 52-53, even considering a contemporary meaning – this points to the powerful love of a suffering Savior.

The book of Isaiah is sometimes called the "fifth Gospel."

The evidence of copies of the book of Isaiah from the Dead Sea Scrolls that are dated long before the time of Christ give tremendous weight to the prophetic message.

- 1) Matthew 3:15; it is proper for us to do this to fulfill all righteousness."

- 3) Matthew 13:14; In them is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah: "You will be ever hearing but never understanding; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving.
- 4) Matthew 26:54; But how then would the Scriptures be fulfilled that say it must happen in this way?"

- 10) Luke 21:24; Jerusalem will be trampled on by the Gentiles until the times of the Gentiles are fulfilled.
- 11) Luke 22:37; It is written: 'And he was numbered with the transgressors'; and I tell you that this must be fulfilled in me. Yes, what is written about me is reaching its fulfillment."
- 12) Luke 24:44; Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."
- 13) John 13:18; But this is to fulfill this passage of Scripture: 'He who shared my bread has turned against me.'
- 14) John 15:25; But this is to fulfill what is written in their Law: 'They hated me without reason.'
- 15) John 17:12; None has been lost except the one doomed to destruction so that Scripture would be fulfilled.



Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news about him spread through the whole countryside.

He was teaching in their synagogues, and everyone praised him.

Note how that prior to the monumental announcement to the citizens of Nazareth about fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah, Jesus was already widely accepted in the area around His home town.

Interesting Notes – Jesus / Isaiah (2)

Jesus ... went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him.

Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me,

... he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

[compare to Matthew 25]

Luke 4:16-19

Think of the shock value to the people there listening to him; but I believe that there is another sort of shock here.

Jesus in this scripture is basically telling his audience that they also should be taking care of people in need.

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

[The Unbelief of the Jews (3)]

Paul contended that just as their ancestors had fulfilled Isaiah's words by their unbelief, so his unbelieving hearers were fulfilling Isaiah's words by their unbelief.

Consequently, Paul asserted, the gospel would now go to the Gentiles (Acts 28:28). ...

Paul's words stand as particularly instructive in that they suggest a multiple fulfillment of Isaiah's words.

Here is the great theological breakthrough of Isaiah's vision and the heart of his gospel.

The Messiah must suffer and rise again. Only thus can the year of the LORD's favor be ushered in.



God wants a relationship! Walk in obedience to all I command you, that it may go well with you. But they did not listen or pay attention; instead, they followed the stubborn inclinations of their evil hearts. Which direction are we going? They went backward and not forward.

[Jeremiah 7:22-24]

What was the first thing God required of Israel when he redeemed them out of Egypt?

That they should set up a sacrificial system?

No, that they should listen to him, obey him (same word in Hebrew), and walk in his ways as set out in the covenant law (7:23; cf. Exod. 19:4-6).

Only after that had been established at Sinai, agreed by the people and sealed in blood (Exod. 19-24), did God speak about a tent, an altar, and sacrifices.

A person who studies the Book of Jeremiah needs to stay in touch with the facts about all five kings who ruled during the prophet's ministry.

These kings are (Jeremiah 1:2-3 skips a couple of generations):

Josiah (son of Amon) – Jeremiah 1:2-3

Jehoahaz / Shallum (2 Chronicles 36:1)

Jehoakim – Jeremiah 1:2-3

Jehoiachin / Coniah (2 Chronicles 36:9)

Zedekiah – Jeremiah 1:2-3

Note: There was a governor (Gedaliah) after Zedekiah was captured.

Is there a prophet who's career spanned more kings?

Interpretation (Prophecy, Scripture, etc.)

When evening came,
many who were demon-possessed were brought to him,
and he drove out the spirits with a word
and healed all the sick.

This was to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet Isaiah:

"He took up our infirmities and bore our diseases." [Isaiah 53:4]

Notice how the idea of "carrying" our diseases, is interpreted as healing the sick.

We do not know to what extent the New Testament writers distinguished carefully between directly fulfilled, secondarily fulfilled, and filled full prophetic words.

What appears obvious is that as they looked at Jesus and at the Old Testament, they had no doubt that Jesus was the one who fulfilled the Old Testament promise.

His prediction, like Jeremiah's, was fulfilled in the horrors of siege, blood and death.

... the tears of the weeping Messiah mirrored the tears of the weeping prophet, and the tears in the heart of God himself.

Jeremiah – Speaking of Tears (2)

Of course, we have heard the sobs of God before, through the tears of Jeremiah (9:10–11).

The fact that God weeps

not only over the suffering of his own people Israel as he brings judgment upon them, but also over the comparable suffering of other nations, is an astonishing and very important insight into the character of the God of biblical revelation.

It is not enough to affirm with Ezekiel that God takes no pleasure in the death of the wicked.

We must also affirm with Jeremiah that God weeps over it.

This is the word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord:

"Listen to the terms of this covenant and tell them to the people of Judah and to those who live in Jerusalem. Tell them that this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'Cursed is the one who does not obey the terms of this covenant - the terms I commanded your ancestors when I brought them out of Egypt, out of the iron-smelting furnace.'

[Remember when the Book of the Law Found]

Josiah was eight years old when he became king, and he ... did what was right in the eyes of the Lord and followed completely the ways of his father David, not turning aside to the right or to the left.

In the eighteenth year of his reign, King Josiah sent the secretary, Shaphan ... to the temple of the Lord. ... [age: 26]

Hilkiah the high priest said to Shaphan the secretary, "I have found the Book of the Law in the temple of the Lord." He gave it to Shaphan, who read it. ... Then Shaphan the secretary informed the king, "Hilkiah the priest has given me a book." And Shaphan read from it in the presence of the king.

When the king heard the words of the Book of the Law, he tore his robes. [this led to a national renewal of the covenant]

2 Kings 22:1-11

[The Book of the Law Found]

It was probably only a part of the complete Book of Deuteronomy that we have today.

Those scholars who suggest chapters 12–26 are probably correct.

[Who kept the other OT documents?

Was it just that the royal hierarchy had not kept up with it, and the loyal priesthood kept the records?]

[Jeremiah 11:1-17]

This first part of his message is almost entirely made up of quotes from Deuteronomy.

Therefore this is what the Lord says:

[There is a plot against Jeremiah]

Because the Lord revealed their plot to me, I knew it, for at that time he showed me what they were doing.

"Let us destroy the tree and its fruit; let us cut him off from the land of the living, that his name be remembered no more."

But you, Lord Almighty, ... to you I have committed my cause.

Therefore this is what the Lord says about the people of Anathoth who are threatening to kill you, saying, 'Do not prophesy in the name of the Lord or you will die by our hands' ...

"I will punish them."

Jeremiah 11:18-22

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 11

'A lamb led to the slaughter' (Jeremiah 11:18–23)

The death-threat was so unexpected that Jeremiah says he would not even have guessed it if God had not warned him. It seems he had become vaguely aware of a plot being hatched in the village. But in his innocence, he had no idea that 'it was against me they were scheming their schemes' (literal word order).

In comparison to their vicious intention to obliterate him, he had been like a vulnerable lamb led to the slaughter – an image that connects the suffering of Jeremiah with the suffering servant of Isaiah 53:7 and is another item in the list of ways in which Jeremiah prefigures Jesus.

[Jeremiah in Danger]

Jeremiah avoided execution. He stood his ground and fortunately had the support of Ahikam. The prophet's befriender was the son of Shaphan, a trusted servant of King Josiah.

Ahikam supervised the cleansing of the temple in Josiah's early years. When the law book was discovered in the temple, Hilkiah the priest gave to it to Shaphan.

Ahikam his son was one of a group who consulted Huldah the prophetess about its validity (2 Kgs. 22:1–14). After the fall of Jerusalem, Nebuchadnezzar chose Gedaliah, son of Ahikam, son of Shaphan, to be governor of the land (2 Kgs. 25:22).

Jeremiah was fortunate to have the support of this godly and influential family.

Did you know the name Shaphan?

[Jeremiah in Danger]

He spoke of his simplistic understanding with a phrase that we also find in another prophet's writings to describe our Savior's voluntary sufferings in the redemptive work at Calvary:

This was probably a current expression in the prophet's day, but it reached undying fame when it was incorporated into God's redemptive activity.



"Why do evil people live free of adversity while those who seek to serve the Lord constantly face reverses and hardships?"

even they have betrayed you.

This was the most unkind cut of all.

... many scholars think that he was to go to a nearby wadi by the name of Perath (as in NIV).

The consonants of that name are identical to the Euphrates in Hebrew; there is just one vowel-point difference.

This would have meant a shorter journey and the effect on the cloth would have been the same.

But possibly the play on words would have been noticed by the people, later at least – given that Euphrates was the great river of Babylon to which they themselves would later be exiled.





He used the metaphor of a stylus or diamond point set into iron.

Judah's indelible sin ... is written permanently and deeply on a tablet with flint.

The use of such a writing instrument may indicate that the tablet is stone or metal, rather than the less durable clay.

In any case, the tablet represents their heart. ...

The Hebrew word translated flint (shamir) may be diamond, referring to the diamond point of an engraving stylus.

In any case, it is a very hard stone ...

Jeremiah had witnessed something very interesting in the relationship between potter and clay. While the potter remained in control, it was not entirely a one-sided affair. Sometimes there was something in the clay that caused the potter to change his original intention.

True, the potter had the power to do what he chose with the clay. But the clay had the 'power' to cause the potter to change his plans. The final result was a mysterious combination of the sovereign will of the potter on the one hand and the condition of the clay on the other. ...

Jeremiah's point is different. He is not so much focusing on the sovereign will of the potter (though that is assumed in v. 6), as on the 'responsibility' of the clay, and on God's freedom to change his plans according to what the 'clay' does. ...

It is not that God is changeable, but that God will consistently respond to our changeability.

As he did with the boy's small lunch of fish and bread, Jesus is able to multiply our seemingly insignificant efforts in phenomenal ways.

The word for the large wine jar Jeremiah was holding was baqbuq.

It was probably onomatopoeic –
the sound of the word matching the sound of water
or wine gurgling out of the narrow neck.

And the word translated 'ruin' in verse 7 is baqaq – meaning 'to empty out, make void, nullify'.

The wordplay (noted in the NIV footnote), suggests that as Jeremiah declared that God was about to 'empty' the plans of Judah and Jerusalem, he dramatically poured the whole contents of the jar out on the rubbish dump.

In his "regression to abnormality,"

Jeremiah poured out a series of curses on himself.

This section resembles Job's outcry (Job 3:1–16) but with one difference.

Job expressed his disillusionment with everything about his life and the universe.

Jeremiah focused on his own problems.

His despair drove him to curse first himself and then all the conditions surrounding his existence.

But he refrained from pronouncing an anathema against his parents or God.

Jeremiah even proclaimed harsh words

against the person who announced his birth.

This was another way of saying he wished he had never been born.

Like Job, he grieved because he did not die in his mother's womb.

Parallel: Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 20 (a Parallel)

'Perplexed but not in despair; persecuted but not abandoned' [2 Cor. 4:8]

The Apostle Paul uttered the words ... in circumstances of crushing stress.

The same kind of stress led to Jeremiah's outburst in this, the last of his personal laments recorded in the book.

For both Jeremiah and Paul there was the pain of rejection and desertion even by former close friends.

For both men the experience was like a sentence of death – feared or wished for.

Yet both of them managed to turn their struggles around towards renewed faith in God's power and protection.

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 20

[Discussion]

Tom: Jeremiah apparently had a miserable life? Did he believe in resurrection?

Ty: People don't respond well to someone screaming at them to believe what they do.

Ray: We need to speak of God's love, not beat people with our perceived "truth".

David: Contrast to the way Nathan spoke to David and caused him to respond from the heart.

Steve: But Jeremiah was pronouncing God's word, which his audience, the Jewish people, were very familiar with (although they pursued their own agenda).

Jonah had much greater success with those who were not God's people!

Jesus was a man of truth.

The Holy Spirit
is the Spirit of truth,
not of correct doctrine.

God seeks a balance.

"God is spirit,
and those who worship him
must worship in spirit and truth" (John 4:24).

Consider the possibility that this could also refer to acting in the "spirit" of the over-arching rules – that of loving God and each other.

Whereas Jeremiah asked God for retribution on his unjust attackers, Jesus asked for their forgiveness.



Why do you prophesy in the Lord's name that this house will be like Shiloh and this city will be desolate and deserted?" And all the people crowded around Jeremiah in the house of the Lord.

When the officials of Judah heard about these things, they went up from the royal palace to the house of the Lord and took their places at the entrance of the New Gate of the Lord's house.

Then the priests and the prophets said to the officials and all the people, "This man should be sentenced to death because he has prophesied against this city. You have heard it with your own ears!"

As for me, I am in your hands; do with me whatever you think is good and right. Be assured, however, that if you put me to death, you will bring the guilt of innocent blood on yourselves and on this city and on those who live in it, for in truth the Lord has sent me to you to speak all these words in your hearing."

Then the officials and all the people said to the priests and the prophets,

"This man should not be sentenced to death! [saved from death]

He has spoken to us in the name of the Lord our God."

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 26

[Jeremiah Threatened With Death]

Some of the elders ... stepped forward and said to the ... assembly of people,

"Micah of Moresheth prophesied in the days of Hezekiah king of Judah. ...
"Did Hezekiah king of Judah or anyone else in Judah put him to death? Did not Hezekiah fear the Lord and seek his favor? And did not the Lord relent, so that he did not bring the disaster he pronounced against them? We are about to bring a terrible disaster on ourselves!"

... Uriah ... was another man who prophesied in the name of the Lord ... the same things against this city and this land as Jeremiah did. When King Jehoiakim and all his officers and officials heard his words, the king was determined to put him to death. But Uriah heard of it and fled in fear to Egypt. Jehoiakim, however, sent Elnathan ... to Egypt, along with some other men... [They] brought Uriah out of Egypt and took him to Jehoiakim, who had him struck down with a sword and his body thrown into the burial place of the common people.

Furthermore, Ahikam son of Shaphan supported Jeremiah, and so he was not handed over to the people to be put to death.

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 26

The great historical Psalm 78 describes the sins of Israel from the exodus to the emergence of the kingdom of David.

But it is easy to see how sentiments like Psalm 78:58–72 could feed popular belief that what happened to Shiloh could never happen to Jerusalem.

On the contrary, says Jeremiah, what happened to Shiloh is precisely what God will now do to the temple in Jerusalem. Judah is doomed to exile, just as the people of Ephraim (Israel) had been.

That was the unthinkable conclusion to an intolerable sermon.

That was the point at which the crowd seized Jeremiah, intent on killing him for such dangerous blasphemy (26:6–9), anticipating the similar reaction to Stephen when he also dared to challenge the assumptions of another generation of temple-trusters.

Then the prophet Jeremiah said to Hananiah the prophet,

Therefore this is what the Lord says: 'I am about to remove you from the face of the earth. This very year you are going to die, because you have preached rebellion against the Lord.'"

Jeremiah wasted no time in returning to Hananiah and his audience.

The writer of the account added without comment, In the seventh month of that same year, Hananiah the prophet died.

This is one of the most amazing fulfillments of a prediction to be found in the Old Testament.







As the chapter progresses, the emphasis moves toward the spiritual blessings awaiting the people.

The latter half of the chapter (31:27–40) contains the new covenant that Yahweh will make with his people.

Many interpreters consider this passage the zenith of Old Testament revelation.

This is the word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord:

"This is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says:

'Write in a book all the words I have spoken to you.

Noah and Abraham

In the Old and New Testaments alike Abraham is the prototype of those who are elected by God.

It might be said, indeed, that Noah, not Abraham, was the first man in the biblical record to be chosen...

But, if we grant this, we must make the point that, whereas the election of Noah and his family meant the destruction of the rest of mankind, the election of Abraham and his family meant the blessing of the rest of mankind; and it is Abraham's election, not Noah's, that provides the scriptural prototype for God's electing grace.

As Abraham's election was designed to bring blessing to "all the families of the earth" (Gen. 12:3), so Abraham's spiritual progeny, described in Eph. 1:4 as "chosen in Christ before the world's foundation to be holy and blameless in the sight of God", are presented not only as God's masterpiece of reconciliation but also as his pilot scheme for the reconciled universe of the future.



[Jeremiah Buys a Field – Key message about looking to the future]

Yahweh used two illustrations (vv. 20–23) from earlier days to reinforce his pledge.

First, his promise that David would never fail to have a son reigning on the throne is as secure as God's decree that night will follow day.

Second, God promises that the descendants of David and the Levites will be as numerous as the stars in the sky and the grains of sand on the seashore.

The word Branch comes from a verb that means "to shoot, sprout, grow up, spring up, arise."

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 35

[The Rekabites – the standard of faithfulness]

This is the word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord during the reign of Jehoiakim ... king of Judah: "Go to the Rekabite family and invite them to come to one of the side rooms of the house of the Lord and give them wine to drink."

So I went to get ... the whole family of the Rekabites. I brought them into the house of the Lord ... Then I set bowls full of wine and some cups before the Rekabites and said to them, "Drink some wine."

But they replied, "We do not drink wine, because our forefather Jehonadab son of Rekab gave us this command: 'Neither you nor your descendants must ever drink wine. Also you must never build houses, sow seed or plant vineyards; you must never have any of these things, but must always live in tents. Then you will live a long time in the land where you are nomads.' We have obeyed everything our forefather Jehonadab son of Rekab commanded us.

'Jehonadab son of Rekab ordered his descendants not to drink wine and this command has been kept. To this day they do not drink wine, because they obey their forefather's command.

"Again and again I sent all my servants the prophets to you. ... But you have not paid attention or listened to me. The descendants of Jehonadab son of Rekab have carried out the command their forefather gave them, but these people have not obeyed me.' ...

Then Jeremiah said to the family of the Rekabites, "This is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says: 'You have obeyed the command of your forefather Jehonadab and have followed all his instructions and have done everything he ordered.' Therefore ... 'Jehonadab son of Rekab will never fail to have a descendant to serve me.'"

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 34 and 35

We can see ... that the two chapters ought to be read (and preached) together.

They are enclosed between two declarations by God about what is about to happen to the city and nation (34:1–7; 35:17–19), but in each case the words of engulfing judgment are combined with a positive alternative future (potentially for Zedekiah and actually for the Rekabites).

Both stories are about covenants or commands made by a leader (Zedekiah, 34:8; Jehonadab, 35:6), though the response of their respective followers is very different.

Both stories involve something that happened in the temple (Zedekiah's covenant, 34:15; Jeremiah's drinks party, 35:2–5).

Both stories highlight repeatedly the theme of listening (or not) to the word of God and choosing to obey (or disobey) what God has commanded (the Hebrew word šāma'-'to hear, to obey'- occurs multiple times through both chapters).

Both stories climax with words of judgment beginning with the ominous therefore (34:17; 35:17).

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36

[Jehoiakim Burns Jeremiah's Scroll]

In the fourth year of Jehoiakim ... king of Judah, this word came to Jeremiah from the Lord: "Take a scroll and write on it all the words I have spoken to you concerning Israel, Judah and all the other nations from the time I began speaking to you in the reign of Josiah till now. Perhaps when the people of Judah hear about every disaster I plan to inflict on them, they will each turn from their wicked ways; then I will forgive their wickedness and their sin."

So Jeremiah called Baruch son of Neriah, and while Jeremiah dictated all the words the Lord had spoken to him, Baruch wrote them on the scroll. Then Jeremiah told Baruch, "I am restricted; I am not allowed to go to the Lord's temple. So you go to the house of the Lord on a day of fasting and read to the people from the scroll the words of the Lord that you wrote as I dictated. Read them to all the people of Judah who come in from their towns. Perhaps they will bring their petition before the Lord and will each turn from their wicked ways, for the anger and wrath pronounced against this people by the Lord are great."

[Jehoiakim Burns Jeremiah's Scroll]

Baruch son of Neriah did everything Jeremiah the prophet told him to do; at the Lord's temple he read the words of the Lord from the scroll. In the ... fifth year of Jehoiakim son of Josiah king of Judah, a time of fasting before the Lord was proclaimed for all the people in Jerusalem and those who had come from the towns of Judah. ... Baruch read to all the people at the Lord's temple the words of Jeremiah from the scroll.

When Micaiah ... heard all the words of the Lord from the scroll, he went down to the secretary's room in the royal palace, where all the officials were sitting: ... After Micaiah told them everything he had heard Baruch read to the people from the scroll, all the officials sent Jehudi ... to say to Baruch, "Bring the scroll from which you have read to the people and come." So Baruch son of Neriah went to them with the scroll in his hand. They said to him, "Sit down, please, and read it to us."

So Baruch read it to them.

Jeremiah 36:8-15

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36

[Jehoiakim Burns Jeremiah's Scroll]

When they heard all these words, they looked at each other in fear and said to Baruch, "We must report all these words to the king." Then they asked Baruch, "Tell us, how did you come to write all this? Did Jeremiah dictate it?" "Yes," Baruch replied, "he dictated all these words to me, and I wrote them in ink on the scroll."

Then the officials said to Baruch, "You and Jeremiah, go and hide. Don't let anyone know where you are."

After they put the scroll in the room of Elishama the secretary, they went to the king in the courtyard and reported everything to him. The king sent Jehudi to get the scroll, and Jehudi brought it ... and read it to the king and all the officials standing beside him. It was the ninth month and the king was sitting in the winter apartment, with a fire burning in the firepot in front of him.

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36

[Jehoiakim Burns Jeremiah's Scroll]

Whenever Jehudi had read three or four columns of the scroll, the king cut them off with a scribe's knife and threw them into the firepot, until the entire scroll was burned in the fire. The king and all his attendants who heard all these words showed no fear, nor did they tear their clothes. Even though Elnathan, Delaiah and Gemariah urged the king not to burn the scroll, he would not listen to them.

Instead, the king commanded Jerahmeel, a son of the king, Seraiah son of Azriel and Shelemiah son of Abdeel to <u>arrest</u> Baruch the scribe and Jeremiah the prophet. <u>But the Lord had hidden them</u>.

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36

[Jehoiakim Burns Jeremiah's Scroll]

After the king burned the scroll containing the words that Baruch had written at Jeremiah's dictation, the word of the Lord came to Jeremiah: "Take another scroll and write on it all the words that were on the first scroll, which Jehoiakim king of Judah burned up.

Also tell Jehoiakim king of Judah, 'This is what the Lord says: You burned that scroll ...

Therefore this is what the Lord says about Jehoiakim king of Judah: He will have no one to sit on the throne of David; ... I will punish him and his children and his attendants for their wickedness; I will bring on them ... and the people of Judah every disaster I pronounced against them, because they have not listened."

So Jeremiah took another scroll and ... Baruch wrote on it all the words of the scroll that Jehoiakim king of Judah had burned in the fire. And many similar words were added to them.

Jeremiah 36:27-32

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36 [Contrast]

(Jeremiah 36:20-26)

Jehoiakim's rejection of the word of God was not a hasty mistake.

It was the most deliberate act of defiance of the spoken and written word of God recorded in the Bible – 'an awesome attempt to eliminate the concrete, sovereign word and will of God'. ...

Undoubtedly the story highlights the contrast between Josiah who, when he heard the Book of the Law read to him, tore his clothes in anguished fear and repentance, and Jehoiakim who, hearing the word of God showed no fear and refused to tear his clothes (24), but instead tore the word of God and burned it (the word cut in v. 23 is the same Hebrew word as tear in v. 24).



Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36 [Interpretation]

Baruch joins a company of writers that includes Tertius (who wrote Paul's letter to the church in Rome) and Silas (who wrote Peter's letter), most of whom remain unnamed – the people who first wrote down the texts through which God continues to speak. ...

So this event, in which a tiny fraction of the Bible got written, contains truths and principles that apply to the rest of the scriptures. The whole Bible, like Baruch's scroll, was written by human beings in very particular circumstances; was written at God's initiative and instruction; contains words that must be read and interpreted as simultaneously human words and the word of God; was written in order to lead people to repentance, forgiveness and salvation; and was written for all to hear and heed. ...

Jeremiah 36 was intended by the compilers of the final book of Jeremiah as a revealing insight into how the words of the prophet spoken by his living voice became the written words of Scripture, and how the living word of God stands behind both.

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 36 [Interpretation]

[Jeremiah's suffering at the hands of the people]

Jeremiah's via dolorosa [sorrowful way] – is how some commentators describe the prolonged suffering of his final years in Jerusalem.

The comparisons with the passion of Christ are notable: there is unjustified arrest, false accusation, the malice of leaders who felt threatened, the collusion of the one man with authority to release God's servant, the steadfast refusal to speak other than God's truth, the prospect of a slow and horrible death.

One major difference is that Jesus, having won the battle in prayer with his Father in Gethsemane, at no point asked his human captors or executioners to release him or ease his suffering, as Jeremiah understandably did.

For Jeremiah, however, it was his attempt to help others save their lives (38: 2) that led to him losing, if not his own life, certainly his freedom and security – what Kidner calls 'this faint foreshadowing of his Master's suffering, of whom it would be said, "He saved others; himself he cannot save."

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 37

[Jeremiah in Prison]

King Zedekiah ... sent Jehukal ... with the priest Zephaniah to Jeremiah the prophet with this message: "Please pray to the Lord our God for us."

Now Jeremiah was free to come and go among the people, for he had not yet been put in prison.

After the Babylonian army had withdrawn from Jerusalem because of Pharaoh's army, Jeremiah started to leave the city to go to the territory of Benjamin to get his share of the property among the people there. But when he reached the Benjamin Gate, the captain of the guard ... arrested him and said, "You are deserting to the Babylonians!" [why didn't they let him go?]

"That's not true!" Jeremiah said. "I am not deserting to the Babylonians." But Irijah would not listen to him; instead, he arrested Jeremiah and brought him to the officials. They were angry with Jeremiah and had him beaten and imprisoned ...

[Zedekiah was not in control]

Picking the Pearls

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 37

[Jeremiah in Prison]

Jeremiah was put into a vaulted cell in a dungeon, where he remained a long time.

Then King Zedekiah sent for him and had him brought to the palace, where he asked him privately, "Is there any word from the Lord?"

"Yes," Jeremiah replied, "you will be delivered into the hands of the king of Babylon."

Then Jeremiah said to King Zedekiah, "What crime have I committed against you or your attendants or this people, that you have put me in prison? ... Do not send me back to the house of Jonathan the secretary, or I will die there."

King Zedekiah then gave orders for Jeremiah to be placed in the courtyard of the guard and given a loaf of bread from the street of the bakers each day until all the bread in the city was gone. So Jeremiah remained in the courtyard of the guard.

[they knew the city was doomed]

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 37

[Jehoiakim and Zedekiah]

Both kings heard Jeremiah's words, loud and clear.

The difference was that Jehoiakim chose to listen in detail with the deliberate intention of rejecting every word he heard.

Zedekiah, on the other hand, actually asked to listen with what appears to be an open mind, prepared at least to believe that Jeremiah did have access to the mind of God.

In the end, of course, it made no difference to the outcome since Zedekiah's ultimate refusal to act on Jeremiah's advice amounted to a rejection of God's word to him, as verse 2 summarily states.

[Jeremiah Thrown Into a Cistern]

[the king's officials] heard what Jeremiah was telling all the people ...

They will escape with their lives; they will live. ... This city will certainly be given into the hands of the army of the king of Babylon, who will capture it."

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 37

[Jeremiah Thrown Into a Cistern]

But Ebed-Melek, a <u>Cushite</u>, an official in the royal palace, heard that they had put Jeremiah into the <u>cistern</u>. [think of the risk to this foreign ambassador]

While the king was sitting in the Benjamin Gate, Ebed-Melek went out of the palace and said to him, "My lord the king, these men have acted wickedly in all they have done to Jeremiah the prophet. They have thrown him into a cistern, where he will starve to death when there is no longer any bread in the city."

Then the king commanded Ebed-Melek the Cushite, "Take thirty men from here with you and lift Jeremiah the prophet out of the cistern before he dies."

So Ebed-Melek took the men with him and went to a room under the treasury in the palace. He took some old rags and worn-out clothes from there and let them down with ropes to Jeremiah in the cistern. Ebed-Melek the Cushite said to Jeremiah, "Put these old rags and worn-out clothes under your arms to pad the ropes." Jeremiah did so, and they pulled him up with the ropes and lifted him out of the cistern.

And Jeremiah remained in the courtyard of the guard. Jeremiah 38:7-13

The king acquiesces with their demand in a way that shows his terrible weakness (38:5) –

[Zedekiah Questions Jeremiah Again]

Then Zedekiah said to Jeremiah, "Do not let anyone know about this [Spin] conversation, or you may die. If the officials hear that I talked with you, and they come to you and say, 'Tell us what you said to the king and what the king said to you; do not hide it from us or we will kill you,' then tell them, 'I was pleading with the king not to send me back to Jonathan's house to die there."

There are some very important unimportant people in the Bible.

That is, there are those who have no glory in the histories of world empires, but who play a vital role in the service of God and the outworking of his kingdom purposes.

Moses' mother and sister who saved the life of Israel's greatest leader; the unnamed widow who preserved Elijah's life;

the slave girl who introduced Naaman to Elisha;

the women who provided for Jesus' needs;

the nephew who gave Paul the tip-off about the threat to his life.

Ebed-Melek.

This faithful African brother had saved the life of Jeremiah.

In return his own life would be saved.

In fact, the vocabulary of salvation granted to him (39:17–18) echoes the same words first promised to Jeremiah himself at his call (1:8, 19; 15:20–21).

However, it is interesting that God's final word to Ebed-Melek is not that God will save him because he saved Jeremiah, but rather because "you trust in me" (39:18).

Here is a foreigner who was doing what the Israelite leaders were refusing to do – trusting in God.

This chapter continues and concludes the events in Jeremiah's life up to the time when the city of Jerusalem fell.

This was the most painful experience of any prophet of whose life we have a record.

[Jeremiah's subsequent history]

Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem, and eventually captured it. He killed King Zedekiah's family and officials and put his eyes out after.

Gedaliah was appointed governor over the land; he was soon assassinated.

People fled to Egypt in fear of Babylonian reprisals.

Many people asked Jeremiah to ask God what they should do.

Jeremiah spoke the word of God, telling them to stay in the land and not flee to Egypt or disaster would follow them.

The people rejected the word of God, though,
["my servants, the prophets", see Jeremiah 44:4]
and took Jeremiah and Baruk with them to Egypt.

Jeremiah prophesied disaster for all of those who went to Egypt, and had Baruch write his words on a scroll.

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 39 - 44 - Parallel

Jeremiah [chose to stay] in Judah rather than go to Babylon showed his noble spirit.

Few people would have chosen to remain a minister of God with the poor people left in the land.

This is another way Jeremiah was probably more like our Savior than any man who ever lived.







Jeremiah had written on a scroll about all the disasters that would come upon Babylon – all that had been recorded concerning Babylon.

He said to Seraiah,

"When you get to Babylon, see that you read all these words aloud.

When you finish reading this scroll, [another copy?]

tie a stone to it and throw it into the Euphrates. destroyed as a lesson]

Then say, 'So will Babylon sink to rise no more because of the disaster I will bring on her.

And her people will fall."

The words of Jeremiah end here.

Jeremiah – Pearls from Chapter 51

It is possible ... that after Jeremiah died Baruch left Egypt and travelled to Babylon.

His brother Seraiah was already there (51:59–64), and possibly others of his family.

As a member of a high-ranking family who had supported a pro-Babylonian policy, he could expect a friendly reception.

This is pure conjecture, of course, but it might explain how the edited scroll of Jeremiah's prophecies eventually reached the exiles in Babylon.





















Interesting Notes

If one takes the date of this prophecy as 605 BC, when Nebuchadnezzar came to power, then the ending of Babylon's power and the consequent ending of the exile of Judah in 538 BC came 67 years later.

The seventy years is thus an approximation for the Babylonian empire itself, not the actual period of exile (... just less than 50 years).

Or, if one starts with the destruction of the temple in 587, it would be approximately 72 years until it was rebuilt in 515.

That is how Zechariah 1:12 understands the period. ...

More likely the figure is a round number signifying a long period of time, in which at least two or three generations would pass.

So Moses went out and told the people what the Lord had said.

Jeremiah – Who is the "Queen of Heaven"? [Ray]

The children gather wood, the fathers light the fire, and the women knead the dough and make cakes to offer to the Queen of Heaven. They pour out drink offerings to other gods to arouse my anger.

[The Israelites respond to Jeremiah by claiming that when they quit worshiping the Queen of Heaven that they were suffering greatly. ... and their husbands knew all about it. Jeremiah 44:17-25]

This title [Queen of Heaven] referred to Ishtar [Ashtoreth or Astarte], an Assyrian and Babylonian goddess ... thought to be the wife of the false god Baal, also known as Molech. The motivation of women to worship Ashtoreth stemmed from her reputation as a fertility goddess, and, as the bearing of children was greatly desired among women of that era, worship of this "queen of heaven" was rampant among pagan civilizations. Sadly, it became popular among the Israelites as well.

In the Hebrew Bible, the Book of Lamentations is called eka, which means "How!"

It is not the interrogative pronoun but a word of profound exclamation.

The unusual designation comes from a custom of the Jews.

They gave their canonical books titles based on the first word or significant expression in the text.

This word eka was habitually used to begin a dirge.

Later Jewish writers called this book Qinot or "dirges."

This was based on the Hebrew word that means "dirge or lament."

Follow-on to Jeremiah – Pearls from Lamentations

Chapters 1-4 are arranged in alphabetic-acrostic structures; the acrostic pattern does not appear in chapter 5.

Each of the 22 verses in chapters 1, 2 and 4
begins with a successive letter of the Hebrew alphabet,
while the acrostic appears in triplicate
in the 66 verses in chapter 3.

The acrostic pattern does not appear in chapter 5, but its influence is felt in that it has 22 verses, the same as the number of letters in the Hebrew alphabet.

Consider how inspiration from God works in this book (and some Psalms): the human author works hard to start each phrase (verse) with the sequence of letters in the alphabet in his own language.

But God works with that to get His message across to us.

Acrostic Poems in the Bible

While most examples of English acrostics are poems that spell out a word, name, or phrase, the acrostic poems in the Old Testament are all *alphabetic* acrostics.

Scholars generally agree that there are fourteen alphabetic acrostic poems in the Old Testament, found across four biblical books:

Psalms 9–10 (which is considered to be one poem), 25, 34, 37, 111, 112, 119, 145;

Proverbs 31:10-31;

Lamentations 1, 2, 3, 4; and

Nahum 1 (the exact verses of the acrostic in Nahum 1 are debated).

Psalm 119 is one of the most well-known psalms, principally because of its impressive length of 176 verses. Yet, another part of its notability is its unique structure: it is an acrostic psalm in which each group of eight lines begins with consecutive letters of the Hebrew alphabet, and it is marked as such in English Bibles by headings of 'aleph', 'beth', and so on.

Follow-on to Jeremiah – Pearls from Lamentations

(Lamentations 3:1–66)

The alphabetic acrostic continues in this poem but with a slightly varied format.

Rather than twenty-two verses, each beginning with a letter of the Hebrew alphabet, we have sixty-six verses.

Three continuous verses begin with the same letter, giving a similar literary effect.

As in the previous chapter, the sixteenth and seventeenth letters are reversed.



- God chooses people for his service but holds them accountable and responsible to obey him.



Interesting Notes

The order of the three major prophets is according to their putative historical settings.

Jeremiah's life and work begins before that of Ezekiel, though the latter is contemporary with the last part of Jeremiah's prophetic work.

In terms of length,

Jeremiah is notable for being the second longest biblical book, preceded only by the massive book of Psalms.

The prophet referred literally to women who were suffering from [abuse] by the enemy.

This was one of the ways Jeremiah was most like Jesus.

Though neither had a wife, both showed a spirit of compassion for the pains women were called on to endure.

(Lamentations 4:1–22)

One writer has called this poem "Jerusalem in the Past and in the Present."

A portion:

The kings of the earth did not believe ...

and the iniquities of her priests ...

who shed within her the blood of the righteous.

They are so defiled with blood that no one dares to touch their garments.

"Go away! You are unclean!" people cry to them.





The Minor Prophets – "The Twelve"

When we speak of "The Twelve", meaning the prophetical books which occupy the final part of the Old Testament in our English Bible, we are following an ancient usage (cf. Ecclesiasticus 40:10).

They are always found together in the Hebrew Bible; they were considered to make up one book, and their place is at the end of the prophetical section, the second of the three sections of the Canon.

It was St. Augustine who first spoke of them as the Minor Prophets; he did so only because of the brevity of the books.

The serial order in which they are fond in our English Bible is that of the Hebrew; it was considered to be the order in which they were written.

The Minor Prophets – "The Twelve"

The twelve books show a remarkable range of type. Hosea, Amos, and Micah are fairly normal collections of prophetic utterances, together with narratives of the prophet's life.

Jonah, on the other hand,

contains very few words spoken by Jonah and is a book about him, probably to be read as an allegory of (instructive) poem.

In the first part of Zechariah a series of visions has a prominent place, and may be taken to be a record of visionary experiences of the prophet or as a literary mode.

In Malachi,

argument between the prophet and his hearers is frequently found, as well as direct prophetic utterance,

showing possibly how the prophet had to present his message to a critical land disbelieving audience.

Interesting Notes (Amos)

It is generally recognized that Amos
was the first of the Israelite prophets
whose words were assembled in a scroll...

Compared with the other prophetic books the Book of Amos is well organized.

There are hints, however, that it too (like the other prophetic books) was compiled by "friends" and grew by stages.

Picking the Pearls

Interesting Notes (Amos)

A good place to begin an analysis of the book's compositional history is with the heading:

"The words of Amos one of the shepherds of Tekoa.

The visions he had about Israel in the time of Uzziah king of Judah and Jeroboam son of Joash, king of Israel, two years before the earthquake" (1:1).

Picking the Pearls

Interesting Notes (Amos)

[Amos' three jobs: shepherd, herdsman (cattle), and tree dresser]

... to tend sycamores is sometimes thought of as a poor man's job, for the sycamore is a fig tree whose fruit had to be scratched, one by one,


before it would open properly – a tedious, dirty job done usually by day-laborers.

... sycamores do not grow in the region of Tekoa, but along the Mediterranean coastal plain and in the Jordan valley.


So each year at the proper time,

Amos travelled to one of these areas and cut open the fig-like fruit of these trees in order to get rid of the insects that invaded them.

Interesting Notes (Amos)

Unlike other Old Testament messengers,

Amos was not a professional prophet;
he had no special training,
nor was he related to any other prophets.

He was a peasant farmer and sheep tender called by God for a special mission.

A native of the southern kingdom of Judah,

Amos received a powerful commission from God

to preach to the people of the northern kingdom of Israel.

In the first half of the eighth century BC, during a time of great expansion and prosperity in Israel, Amos spoke out against the economic injustices between urban elites and the poor.

Interesting Notes (Amos)

- The concept of religion which an individual or a group of people possesses determines their attitudes and their way of life.
- The Israelites of the eight century B.C. regarded religion as only one aspect of life.
- It consisted of external acts that they carried out when they went to different temples in the land.
- They prided themselves in their expensive "church buildings" (Amos 5:4-5; 7:9, 13).
- They boasted of the numerous sacrifices which they offered, and of the fact that they offered them exactly as the Law prescribed (Amos 4:4-5, 5:22).
- They gloried in their perfect attendance record at the worship services (Amos 5:21).
- They were well pleased with their efforts to sing praises to the Lord (Amos 5:23).

Picking the Pearls

Interesting Notes (Amos)

By way of contrast,

Amos rejected the idea that quantity, numbers, and external show was really religion.

He declared that religion is not just one aspect of life, but is the whole of life.

It involves military and political beliefs and decisions, social and economic views and activities, and all attitudes of the regular worshipper.

For Amos, there was no phase of life which was irreligious.

Activities which take place in the "church building" were only a small part of religion.
