

I knew that the Psalmist found ways to connect ideas as though they were pieces of a puzzle. But there was another dimension to it, that of building a strong, beautiful, and useful structure. David “loved the law” with a great passion, such that he described it in his own words again and again. He took the raw material and worked it and reworked it into a continual life of worship. It never got old and stale to him, for he was refreshed by it<sup>1</sup>.

Imagine David as a young man, staying out in the fields under the stars while he watched the sheep. He could see him putting words together in different patterns and feeling the rhythm and meaning when everything fit together. He did not just love the Word, he loved to reassemble the words from it in ways that helped glorify the name of God. But he also constructed songs of sorrow and despair from the emotions that flowed from his sensitive heart. In these structures that he built, he found ways to help people understand all the levels and states of their emotional lives.

I believe God truly enjoys watching us put together our ideas about Him in different ways<sup>2</sup>. They aren’t all correct, but they are all a sign of our love for Him. David loved God with a love that flowed into psalms with words so well joined together that they became things of beauty and power that brought life and joy to others<sup>3</sup>. The Creator was so clearly “declared<sup>4</sup>” to him that he saw the power of His Presence no matter what was his situation in life.

It is a wonder, in a way, that David could see God’s Goodness so clearly without the full knowledge that we now have of the self-sacrifice of the Savior (a descendent of David, as a matter of fact), who died on the cross for us<sup>5</sup>. Even without this direct knowledge of the future, though, he could “see” the eternal kingdom, and wanted to be in it with God forever<sup>6</sup>. David could see farther through his honest and persistent pursuit of God.

David loved the law<sup>7</sup> because he loved the principles of God’s Goodness that were their foundation<sup>8</sup>. This is why he was called “a man after God’s own heart<sup>9</sup>.” And so should we all aspire to be.

I love to study the Bible because it stirs a creativity in me to build something from what I learn. Worship is not just a reassembling of rules to suit me – it invokes the transformation of a heart to suit God. In my storytelling, I find that this is essential to enabling others to see His Glory.

Just as David created his psalms, Jesus Himself presented truths of the Kingdom in parables, and I believe that in any life situation we all can find an analogy or allegory that could help us to see God more clearly. It is like holding up images of things that we encounter in life and comparing them to God to find deeper meaning. It is to take every thought captive<sup>10</sup> as we dig for greatest treasure of all<sup>11</sup>.
