We are all sinners in the eyes of the omnipotent God<sup>1</sup>, who is full of justice and mercy in a way that we cannot understand very well. The Psalmist felt the impact of this, which made him feel weak<sup>2</sup>, and we also may think that our sinful condition is a burden too heavy for us to carry.

We may be sinners, but that does not mean that we are truly evil from God's perspective. He is the ultimate Goodness, and even though we are sinners and act sometimes as enemies, God still loves us<sup>3</sup>.

We are truly far from Him in our essentially infinitesimal "goodness"<sup>4</sup>. I don't think that God would have sent his Son to earth to die for us if he did not see a spark of good<sup>5</sup> there that He knew could be worked with. We are indeed not very good, but within each of us is a great capacity for good. And sometimes there is that spark of goodness that God can see.

I can imagine God looking down on His creation, and the people that inhabit it. In the spiritual darkness that descended on the world due to the fall of man, He would be able to visualize tiny flashes of light – the sign of sparks of goodness for activities that people were carrying out<sup>6</sup>. Such activities include the simple acts of kindness that are equivalent to serving the Christ<sup>7</sup> (and thus God). The strongest flashes would be emitted by those who, like Christ, sacrificed themselves for others. Indeed, as Christ is the light of the world (and thus of life)<sup>8</sup>, His flash completely outshines any others; it would be overpoweringly dazzling (except, of course, to God).

I think that God is so pleased at this view, because He loves goodness so much. It is true that there is so much blackness on earth; but it only makes the contrast greater when the sparks occur. He loves to see people struggling to do what's right.

We are not to despair about our failures, for it is God's grace that will see us through. That grace enables us to bear this burden of knowledge and go on, growing to be more and more like Him and having the joyous life that he meant for us all to have as Christians<sup>9</sup>.

But God will only work through us when we recognize our weakness for sin, for His power is made perfect in weakness<sup>10</sup>. God made the universe from nothing, and it is not until we become nothing that he can make anything out of us<sup>11</sup>. This weakness of ours can be lived with if we understand the working of the tremendous grace of God. He can fan that spark into a flame<sup>12</sup>! Our real strength is only through Him<sup>13</sup>.
